## STATE OF MAINE

## IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND THIRTEEN.

AN ACT to regulate Advertisements and Solicitations for Employees during Strikes, Lockouts or other Labor Disputes.

Bc it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:
Section I. If an employer, during the continuance of a
2 strike among his employees, or during the continuance of
3 a lockout or other labor trouble among his employees, pub4 licly advertises in newspapers, or by posters or otherwise,
5 for employees, or by himself or his agents solicits persons
6 to work for him to fill the places of strikers, he shall plainly
7 and explicitly mention in such advertisements or oral or

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8 written solicitations that a strike, lockout or other labor 9 disturbance exists.

Sect. 2. The provisions of this act shall cease to be opera-2 tive when the state board of conciliation and arbitration 3 shall determine that the business of the employer, in re-4 spect to which the strike or other labor trouble occurred, is 5 being carried on in the normal and usual manner and to 6 the normal and usual extent. Said board shall determine 7 this question as soon as may be, upon the application of the 8 employer.

Sect. 3. If any person, firm, association or corporation 2 violates any provision of this act, he or it shall be guilty 3 of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be 4 punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars nor 5 more than fifty dollars.
