STATEMENT OF FACTS

The legislature of 1917 reduced the rate of interest payable by the state to plantations on their wild land school funds from six per cent to four per cent, thereby seriously crippling the school work of the plantations because of lack of adequate funds. This resolve is to indemnify said plantations by reason of the foregoing. This is to cover the period from July 1, 1917, until Dec. 31, 1917.
