STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND
NINE HUNDRED AND NINETEEN

RESOLVE, to Appoint a Committee to Inquire into the Advisability of Purchasing the Residence of the Late James G. Blaine or Some Other Suitable Property for an Executive Mansion.

WHEREAS, it is now obligatory that the Governor reside in Augusta during his term of office; and

WHEREAS, the expense of so doing may prove so great a burden as to prevent men of limited means from aspiring to the office of Governor; now, therefore,

Resolved: The House concurring, that a special committee of two on the part of the Senate and three on the part of the House be appointed to inquire into the advisability of purchasing the residence of the late James G. Blaine or some other suitable property for a home for the

6 Governor while in office, to be known as the Executive
7 Mansion, and to report by bill or otherwise.
