STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND  
NINE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-ONE

AN ACT to Amend Section Thirty-five of Chapter One Hundred and Twenty-six of the Revised Statutes Relating to Prohibiting Business and Recreation on Sunday.

---

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section thirty-five of chapter one hundred and twenty-six of the revised statutes is hereby amended by striking out the whole of said section and by substituting therefor the following section:

'Sect. 35. Business and recreation prohibited on Sunday.  
Whoever on Sunday keeps open or conducts his place of business, or does any work or labor for hire; conducts any sport, show, game or recreation; or is present at any dancing,

5 public diversion, show or entertainment, encouraging the  
6 same, shall be punished by fine not exceeding ten dollars;  
7 provided however that this section shall not apply to oper-  
8 ating railroads, steam or electric, steamships, or ferry-boats;  
9 to the driving of taxi cabs or public carriages; to printing  
10 and selling Sunday newspapers; to the keeping open of ho-  
11 tels, restaurants, garages, drug, tobacco or confectionery  
12 stores; to the selling of gasoline; to giving scientific, philo-  
13 sophical, religious, or educational lectures; to conducting  
14 or taking part in musical concerts, amateur baseball games  
15 and other field sports not involving the element of pecuniary  
16 profit; nor to works of necessity, charity, or religion.'
