## STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE  
HUNDRED AND THIRTY-ONE

AN ACT Relative to Ice Fishing in Nash Lake, Sometimes  
Called East Maguerrowock Lake.

---

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for citizens of the state, licensed as provided by section nineteen, chapter thirty-eight of the revised statutes, during the months of February and March to fish for and take land locked salmon, trout, togue and pickerel with not more than five set lines to each family, through this ice, in the daytime, and under the immediate personal supervision of the person fishing, in Nash, otherwise called East Maguerrowock Lake, lying partly in Robbinston and partly in Calais in Washington County, and may convey fish so caught to their homes for consumption therein, but not otherwise.

Sect. 2. It shall be lawful for citizens of the state and non-residents, specially licensed as provided in section nineteen, chapter thirty-eight of the revised statutes to fish for and take land locked salmon, trout, togue, white perch and pickerel in Nash, otherwise called East Maguerrowock Lake, in Calais, Washington County, from the time the ice goes out until September first each year, and may convey fish so caught to their homes for consumption therein, but not otherwise.

Sect. 3. Any person convicted of violating either of the preceding sections may be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars, and in addition thereto one dollar for each fish unlawfully caught.

Sect. 4. Any act inconsistent herewith is hereby repealed.
