STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED FIFTY-THREE

AN ACT Relating to the Taking of Blood-Worms in Georgetown.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, acts of the legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment; and

Whereas, it is vitally necessary that the following legislation be effective immediately in order to permit non-residents of Georgetown to take bloodworms within the town of Georgetown; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the constitution of Maine, and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 34, § 81, amended. Section 81 of chapter 34 of the revised statutes, as revised, is hereby amended by adding after the 2nd sentence thereof, a new sentence, to read as follows:

'Provided, however, that for the taking or digging of blood-worms a license may be granted or issued to any person, firm or corporation not a resident of said town of Georgetown.'

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this shall take effect when approved.
