CHAPTER CLVI.

AN ACT to rectify the west line of the town of Concord.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That from and after the passing of this act, the dividing line between township number one, and township number two, in the first range of townships in the million of acres, west of Kennebec river, as now run and marked for the proprietors, be, and the same is hereby made and established, as the west line of the town of Concord, in the county of Somerset; any thing in the act incorporating said town to the contrary notwithstanding.

CHAPTER CLVII.

AN ACT to incorporate St. George's Lodge.

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled*, That John Miller, Benjamin Arnold, Isaac G. Reed, and Jacob Ludwig, junior, with their associates and successors, be, and they hereby are incorporated into a body politic, by the name of St. George's Lodge, with power to sue and be sued; to have a common seal, and to change the same; to make any by-laws for the management of their affairs, not repugnant to the laws of the State; to take and hold for charitable and benevolent uses, any real estate, to the value of three thousand dollars, and any personal estate to the value of five thousand dollars; and to give and grant or bargain and sell the same; and with all the
