SECT. 2. *Be it further enacted*, That the seventh and eighth sections of the act to which this is additional, be and the same hereby are repealed so far as the provisions of the same relate to lumber exported or intended to be exported coastwise, unless the shipper or shippers shall prefer to have their lumber surveyed or inspected as provided in said act.

CHAPTER CCLI.

AN ACT altering the time of holding the Court of Sessions in the county of York.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That the term of the Court of Sessions, which is now by law held at Alfred on the third Tuesday of October annually, shall hereafter be held at the same place on the second Tuesday of October annually, within and for the same county.

CHAPTER CCLII.

AN ACT additional to an Act respecting Academies incorporated within this State.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That the time limited by the Act to which this is additional, for Academies to go into operation and be in possession of funds, and otherwise provided for instruction, be and the same is hereby extended to two years from and after the first day of May next, any thing in the Actaforementioned to the contrary notwithstanding.
