CHAP. 7.

Resolve for the assistance of the Deaf and Dumb.

Approved February 5, 1829.

RESOLVED, That a sum not exceeding one thousand dollars, in each year, for the term of four years, commencing on the twenty third day of February next, be appropriated for the instruction and education of the indigent Deaf and Dumb, in the State of Maine, to be expended by the Governor and Council, at their discretion, defraying, in whole or in part, according to the needs of such as may make application, the expense of placing at the American Asylum, such Deaf and Dumb persons, as may appear the most proper subjects for education at such Institution.

CHAP. 8.

Resolve authorizing the Governor to negotiate with the Penobscot Indians for the transfer of two townships of land to the State.

Approved February 7, 1829.

RESOLVED, That the Governor, with the advice of the Council, be, and hereby is empowered to appoint and commission some suitable person to negotiate with the Penobscot tribe of Indians for a release of their claim to either, or both, or any part of the two townships of land situate at the mouth of the Matawamkeag river, for such equivalent as may be agreed on, which shall be secured to said Indians, with interest, and paid to them at such times, and in such a manner as the Governor and Council may direct.
