PUBLIC LAWS

OF THE

STATE OF MAINE,

1844.

CHAP. 100. Beginning at the northwest corner of township number eight, in the eighth range of townships west from the east line of the state; thence north to a point due west from the northwest corner of township numbered ten, in the seventh range of townships west from the east line of the state; thence west to the west line of state.

SECT. 6. This act shall be in force from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 100.

AN ACT to amend the sixty-sixth chapter of the revised statutes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Ch. 66, R. S. relative to hogshhead hoops, amended.

All hogshhead hoops, exposed for sale, or packed for exportation, shall be from ten to thirteen feet in length, and of oak, ash or walnut, and of good and sufficient substance, well shaved; if of oak or ash, at least one inch broad, and, if of walnut, three quarters of an inch at the least end; and the fourteenth section of the sixty-sixth chapter of the revised statutes is hereby repealed.

Chapter 101.

AN ACT in addition to chapter one hundred and sixty-eight of the revised statutes, in relation to imprisonment of convicts under sentence of death.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Ch. 168, R. S., relative to convicts sentenced to suffer death, amended.

When any person shall be convicted of any crime punishable with death, and sentenced to suffer such punishment, he shall, at the same time be sentenced to solitary confinement and hard labor in the state prison, until such punishment of death shall be inflicted.
