Chapter 46.

CHAP. 46.

Resolve in favor Samuel Sterling.

Resolved, That the land agent is hereby authorized to convey to Samuel Sterling four lots of land in the town of Masardis to contain in the whole not exceeding six hundred and forty acres, the same being in full for all labor performed by him on roads in said town, and for timber taken from lots selected by him.

Chapter 47.

Resolve authorizing the publication of the school laws of this state.

Resolved, That the secretary of state is hereby authorized and directed to prepare in pamphlet form, a compilation of the laws relating to public schools, with an index and marginal references; and cause the same to be printed and distributed to the several cities, towns and plantations in this state, one copy being allowed to the superintending school committee of each city and town, and one copy to each school-district in the state, and a sum not exceeding fifty dollars is hereby appropriated to carry this resolve into effect.

Chapter 48.

Resolve providing for the payment of expenses of the president's visit.

Resolved, That there be and hereby is appropriated the sum of nine hundred and seventy-three dollars and fifty-one cents for the expenses incurred by the committee of arrangements in the reception and entertainment of James K. Polk, president of the United States, on his recent visit to the capital of the state, and that said sum be expended by the state treasurer in the payment of those bills which the said committee of arrangements shall certify and allow as correct and due.
