Chapter 437.

CHAP. 437.

An act to incorporate the Ellsworth Bank.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. Seth Tisdale, Andrew Peters, Charles Peters, Thomas D. Jones, John M. Hale, Seth Padleford, George W. C. Means and Samuel Dutton, their associates, successors and assigns, be and hereby are incorporated into a company by the name of the President, Directors and Company of the Ellsworth Bank.

Corporators.

Corporate name.

SECT. 2. The capital stock of said bank shall be fifty thousand dollars, to be divided into shares of one hundred dollars each.

Capital stock.

SECT. 3. The said corporators are hereby authorized and empowered to exercise all the rights and privileges conferred upon such corporations by the laws of this state, and subject to all the liabilities and restrictions thereof. And said bank shall be located and established in Ellsworth, in the county of Hancock.

Chapter 438.

An act in addition to an act to incorporate the city of Calais.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. The mayor, aldermen, clerk and treasurer of the city of Calais, are constituted the board of trustees of the ministerial and school funds belonging to said city, with power to hold, manage and dispose of said funds, in the same manner as the selectmen, town clerk and town treasurer were authorized to do, under the town organization.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor.
