#### Chapter 11.

Chap. 11.

Resolve in favor of Peol Sockis.

Resolved. There be paid out of the treasury to Peol Sockie, Peol Sockie. representative from the Penobscot Indians, the sum of fifty dollars.

[Approved March 1, 1853.]

### Chapter 12.

Resolve in favor of Henry Pennell.

Resolved, That the commissioners for the county of Cumber- Account land, be and they hereby are authorized and empowered to receive, audit and allow the claim of Henry Pennell, of Gray, in said county, for costs, damages and expenses by him incurred and sustained in an action of trespass, Stephen Small against him, by reason of the irregular and illegal proceedings of the court of county commissioners for said county of Cumberland, a report of which action as decided by the supreme judicial court is published in the reports of judicial decisions for Maine, volume thirty-first, page two hundred and sixty-seven; and to draw their warrant upon the treasurer of said county, in favor of said Henry Pennell, for the amount to be by them so audited and allowed.

### Chapter 13.

Resolve in favor of the Passamaquoddy Indians.

Resolved, That there be paid the agent of the Passama- Furnishing quoddy Indians, out of the treasury of the state, two hundred chapel, &c. dollars, to be by him expended under the direction of the governor and council, in furnishing their chapel on the Indian township with a bell, seats, and other things necessary to make the same convenient for a place of public worship; said agent to render an account of his doings in the premises to the governor and council, in the same manner as he is by law required to account for other expenditures.
