CHAP. 81.

on the fifth day of October next. And the treasurer of state is also authorized and directed to deliver to the treasurer of said commonwealth the certificates of stock provided for by the second resolve, bearing date the fifth day of October, eighteen hundred and fifty-three, *provided* the authorities of said commonwealth shall be ready to deliver a good and sufficient deed to convey to the State of Maine the lands belonging to said commonwealth, lying in the State of Maine, including all claims upon settlers, according to the contract of said commissioners mentioned in the first resolve, which said deed shall first be examined and approved by the commissioners on the part of the State of Maine.

Chapter 81.

Resolve in relation to lighting the public buildings.

Public buildings
to be lighted
with gas.

Resolved, That the superintendent of public buildings be authorized to contract for lighting said buildings with gas, providing the governor and council shall deem the same expedient.

Chapter 82.

Resolve authorizing the governor and council to audit and pay the claims of honorable Reuel Williams, William P. Fessenden and Elijah L. Hamlin, commissioners to purchase the Massachusetts lands.

In favor of

Resolved, That the governor and council be and they hereby are authorized to audit and settle the claims of honorable Reuel Williams, William P. Fessenden, and Elijah L. Hamlin, for their services and expenses as commissioners in negotiating for the purchase of the Massachusetts lands. And the governor, with the advice and consent of council, is authorized to draw his warrant upon the treasurer of state in favor of each of the aforesaid individuals for the amount which may be found due, to be paid out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.
