Land agent directed to set off and convey certain land to

George W.

Smith.

TOWNSHIP L, RANGE TWO .- TOWNS OF BETHEL, &c.-REFORM SCHOOL.

Chapter 168.

Resolve in relation to township L, range two.

Resolved, That the land agent be directed to convey and set off to George W. Smith of Van Buren plantation, in full settlement of all claims between said Smith and the state, six thousand acres of land from that part of township L, range two, set off to said Smith by virtue of the resolve approved March thirteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven.

Chapter 164.

Resolve in favor of the treasurers of the towns of Bothel, Stoneham and Clifton, also of A. Spooner.

Resolved, That there be paid out of the state treasury from any money not otherwise appropriated, to the treasurer of the town of Bethel, two dollars, to the treasurer of the town of Stoneham, two dollars, to the treasurer of the town of Clifton, six dollars, to Λ . Spooner, six dollars, said several sums being for bounty paid by them upon wild animals as by law provided.

Chapter 165.

Resolve providing for an appropriation for the state reform school.

Resolved, That there be appropriated and paid out of any money in the treasury of the state, the sum of fifteen thousand dollars, for the payment of past arrearages, and to meet and defray the expenses of the state reform school, for the financial year of that institution, ending March thirty-first, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.
