PRIVATE AND SPECIAL LAWS

OF THE

STATE OF MAINE.

1863.

Sect. 2. The doings of said district at a meeting thereof held Chap. 209. on the seventeenth of April, in the year one thousand eight hun-Same. dred and sixty-one, authorizing their agent to borrow such a sum of money as the exigencies of the district may require over and above the amount raised by tax, and the doings of the agent pursuant thereto in procuring on the credit of the district the sum of four hundred and fifty-four dollars and seventy-seven cents, are hereby made valid and binding.

Authorized to

The said school district is hereby authorized pursuant to a vote of the district to that effect at any legal meeting thereof, borrow money to borrow from time to time any sum of money for the purposes of said district, not however to create an indebtedness of the district at any one time exceeding two thousand dollars.

This act takes effect when approved by the governor.

Chapter 209.

An act authorizing the expenditure of money for war purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Sect. 1. The sum of seventy thousand dollars, or so much Appropriation for certain thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated for the pay- purposes. ment of outstanding war claims, relief to our sick and wounded soldiers in hospitals, transportation of hospital stores, and all other necessary expenses for the volunteer force raised in this state.

- Sect. 2. All expenditures under this act shall be made under the direction of the governor and council.
- This act shall take effect when approved by the governor.

Approved February 9, 1863.

Chapter 210.

An act to change names of certain persons.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. Daniel Talcott Smith, his wife Sophia Hammond Smith, Names and their children, Frances Sophia Smith, Elizabeth Talcott Smith and Rowland Mather Smith, all of Bangor, shall be allowed to take

Chap. 211. the names respectively of Daniel Smith Talcott, Sophia Hammond Talcott, Frances Sophia Talcott, Elizabeth Talcott and Rowland Mather Talcott; Emily Jewell of Poland, shall be allowed to take the name of Emily J. Waterhouse; Patrick Campbell Pratt of Bangor, shall be allowed to take the name of Walter Campbell Pratt; Michael Dyer of Brooksville, shall be allowed to take the name of Edward M. Dyer; Alice Collins Hyde, daughter of Elizabeth A. Wheelwright of Portland, shall be allowed to take the name of Alice Collins Wheelwright; James Crowes of Portland, shall be allowed to take the name of Charles Mayerick.

> This act shall take effect when approved by the governor.

Chapter 211.

An act to provide in part for the expenditures of government.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Appropriations.

Sect. 1. In order to provide for several acts and resolves of the legislature requiring the payment of money from the treasury, and also to provide for the necessary expenditures of government for the current fiscal year, the following sums are hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury; and the governor with the advice and consent of the council is hereby authorized at any time prior to the first day of January next, to draw his warrant upon the treasury for the same:
