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**Chapter 347.**

An act to extend and amend "an act to establish the Dexter and Newport Railroad," approved March thirtieth, eighteen hundred and fifty-three.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

SECT. 1. The time for the location and completion of said Dexter and Newport Railroad be and is hereby extended to January first, eighteen hundred and seventy. Location, time of, extended.

SECT. 2. The directors of said railroad company are hereby authorized to lease said railroad to the Maine Central Railroad Company, and to make such other contracts with the directors of said company as may be necessary for the operation of their road. Authorized to lease railroad, &c.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force on and after its approval by the governor.

**Chapter 348.**

An act to incorporate the Portland Dry Dock Company.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

SECT. 1. Jacob McLellan, Theophilus C. Hersey, Charles M. Davis, John B. Coyle, Joseph W. Dyer, William Chase, William W. Woodbury, Orlando M. Marrett, Jonas H. Perley and William Ross, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby created a corporation by the name of the Portland Dry Dock Company, for the purpose of erecting and maintaining a dry dock in the city of Portland, with power by that name to sue and be sued, use a common seal, and have all the privileges and powers, and be subject to all the liabilities and requirements of corporations as defined by the laws of this state. Powers, privileges, &c.

SECT. 2. The said corporation may purchase and hold real and personal estate to an amount not exceeding two hundred thousand dollars, with full power to manage and dispose of the same. May hold real and personal estate.

SECT. 3. Any five of the persons named in this act may call the first meeting of said corporation at such time and place as they may see fit, by giving two weeks notice in some newspaper published in Portland, for the purpose of organizing said corporation. First meeting, how called.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor.
