Chapter 297.

Resolve in favor of Eliza C. Prouty, of township number two, range three, in the county of Aroostook.

Resolved, That there be paid out of the state treasury to Eliza C. Prouty, of township number two, range three, the sum of one hundred and twenty-seven dollars, and that the governor be authorized to draw his warrant on the treasury for the same.

Chapter 298.

Resolve to appropriate money for the repairs of the Rocky Rips bridge in township number one, Penobscot county.

Resolved, That there be appropriated and paid out of the state treasury, to be expended under the direction of the land agent, the sum of fifty dollars, for repairs on the bridge over the Passadumkeag river, in township number one, north division, in the county of Penobscot, on the road from Lowell to near the mouth of Olaman stream in Greenbush.

Chapter 299.

Resolves establishing the valuation of the towns of Columbia and Columbia Falls.

Resolved, That the number of polls set to the valuation of the town of Columbia be one hundred and sixty-one, and the value of estates one hundred eleven thousand one hundred sixty-three dollars.

Resolved, That the number of polls set to the town of Columbia Falls be one hundred and thirty-five, and the value of estates one hundred thirty-eight thousand and eighty-one dollars.

Resolve relating to the president and vice president of the United States.

Resolved, That for their eminent services to their country in the years of its gravest peril, president Abraham Lincoln and vice
