CHAP. 41.

Chapter 41.

An act to change the time of the session of the county commissioners' court, of the county of Kennebec, from the last to the third Tuesday of December.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Term of court to
be held third
Tuesday of Dec.

The term of the county commissioners' court, of the county of Kennebec, which is now required to be held on the last Tuesday of December of each year, shall hereafter be held on the third Tuesday of December of each year.

Chapter 42.

An act to authorize Stephen G. Hodgdon to extend his wharf into tide waters in the town of Boothbay.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Extension of
wharf authorized.

SECT. 1. Stephen G. Hodgdon of Boothbay, his associates, successors and assigns, are hereby authorized to extend his wharf, in the town of Boothbay, into tide waters, not, however, to extend a distance of more than thirty feet beyond its present limit.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 43.

An act to authorize the Skitticook Dam Company to increase its tolls.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Increase of tolls
authorized.

SECT. 1. The Skitticook Dam Company, incorporated by an act of the legislature, approved March twenty-fourth, eighteen hundred fifty-nine, is hereby authorized and empowered to increase its

tolls from fifteen to twenty-five cents per thousand feet board measure. CHAP. 44.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 44.

An act to incorporate the Damariscotta Village Savings Bank.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. Edwin Flye, G. E. Hitchcock, Fred. L. Webb, Wm. K. Hilton, Daniel F. Hutchings, E. B. Woodward, Thaddeus Weeks, Gould Bailey, Roscoe Campbell, James A. Hall, B. D. Metcalf, Willard Oliver, Joel Huston, Elden Chapman, J. M. Haines, Austin Hall, Thomas J. Merrill, U. W. Woodward, Edward K. Hall, Robert Dixon and David W. Chapman, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate by the name of the Damariscotta Village Savings Bank, with power by that name to prosecute and defend suits at law and in equity, to have and use a common seal, and make all such by-laws, rules and regulations as are necessary to the government and management of their concerns, and not repugnant to the laws of the state. Said corporation shall be established in either the town of Damariscotta or Newcastle, in said state of Maine, as a majority of the corporators may determine, and shall be subject to all the duties and liabilities, and enjoy all the rights and privileges incident to such corporations.

SECT. 2. Said corporation is hereby authorized to receive deposits of money and to issue certificates therefor, and such deposits of money shall be used as shall be judged most for the benefit of said corporation, and such deposits may be withdrawn at such reasonable times and in such manner as such corporation by its by-laws may determine, and the net income or profit thereof shall be divided among the persons making such deposits, their successors, administrators or assigns, in equitable proportion.

SECT. 3. Any three corporators named herein may call the first meeting of said corporation, by posting in some conspicuous places in the towns of Damariscotta and Newcastle a notice of the same seven days before the meeting is held. At said first meeting, and every subsequent meeting regularly called, said corporation may elect by ballot any person or persons as members thereof, and may choose such officers as to them may seem proper, who shall continue in office one year, and until others are
