Chapter 108.

An act to incorporate the Solon Savings Bank.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Corporators.	SECT. 1. George M. Langley, Edmund Coolidge, Sumner Webb, Alvah Lord, Thomas T. Dodge, Henry M. Bodwell, Winthrop Eldridge, Stephen Merrill, John L. Pierce, Jotham Whipple, Turner Buzwell, John H. Rowell, Samuel Curtis, Justus Hamblet, Absalom Parkman, Henry Lowell and Joseph Maynard, their associates and successors, are hereby incorporated into a body politic and
Corporate name. Power.	and corporate by the name of the Solon Savings Bank, with power by that name to prosecute and defend suits at law and equity, have and use a common seal, make by-laws, for the management of their concerns, not repugnant to the laws of the state, and said
Location.	corporation shall be established in the town of Solon, with the
Rights and privileges.	right to exercise and enjoy all the rights and privileges incident to such corporations.
Deposits.	SECT. 2. Said corporation may receive from any person or persons any deposit or deposits of money and may use the same for the purposes and with the restrictions hereinafter provided.
Deposits, how used.	SECT. 3. All deposits of money received by said corporation shall be used as they shall judge most for the benefit of said corporation, and the net income or profits thereof shall be by them
Profits, how divided.	divided among the persons making such deposits, their executors, administrators or assigns, in just proportion and such deposits
May be withdrawn.	may be withdrawn at such reasonable times and in such manner as said corporation shall appoint.
Loans.	SECT. 4. Said corporation shall not loan any of its deposits upon personal security alone.
First meeting, how called.	SECT. 5. The first meeting of said corporation may be called by any three of the named corporators in this act by giving seven days' written notice to each of the other corporators of the time and place of such meeting, at which meeting and every subsequent
May elect associates. Officers.	annual meeting, said corporation may elect by ballot any person or persons members thereof; may choose such officers as to them may seem proper for their organization and government, who shall so continue in office one year, and until others are chosen
Tenure of office.	and qualified in their stead; and the persons elected treasurer and secretary before entering upon their official duties shall be sworn to the faithful discharge of their duties, and the treasurer shall
Bond of treasurer.	also give bond satisfactory to such corporation for the faithful discharge of his duties. The offices of treasurer and secretary may be united in one person.
Deeds of conveyance.	SECT. 6. All deeds of conveyance, covenants and grants made in behalf of said corporation, shall be sealed with a corporate seal, and when made in pursuance of any vote of the corporation,

shall be valid and effectual to convey property or bind the corporation. CHAP. 109.

SECT. 7. The annual meetings may be held at such time and place as the by-laws of the corporation shall prescribe, and it shall require seven persons at least to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; and said corporation may provide in what manner their meetings may be notified and called. Special meetings of the corporation may be directed by the president or trustees.

Chapter 109.

An act to incorporate the Winterport Cemetery Association.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. James Haley, A. L. Kelley, T. Cushing, James B. McDermot, William Treat, Nathan Cushing, John M. Snow, Ezra Manter, Charles Abbott, Elisha Chick, T. O. Thompson, Elbridge Fernald, T. H. Cushing, George S. Silsby, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby created a body politic and corporate under the name of the Winterport Cemetery Association, to be established and have their place of business in Winterport, in the county of Waldo, with power to adopt a corporate seal, to sue and be sued, to take and hold for burial purposes real and personal estate to the value of five thousand dollars, to give, grant, bargain, sell and convey the same at pleasure with all the privileges and rights usually granted to such corporations.

SECT. 2. T. Cushing, William Treat and A. L. Kelley, are hereby authorized and empowered to call the first meeting for organization of said corporation by giving five days' personal notice to the other persons named in this act.
