Chapter 184.**CHAP. 184.**

An act to incorporate the town of Limestone.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. Limestone plantation, composed of letter E township in the first range, W. E. L. S., in Aroostook county, is hereby incorporated into a town by the name of Limestone, and the inhabitants of said town are hereby invested with all the powers, privileges, immunities and liabilities of other towns.

SECT. 2. Any justice of the peace within the county of Aroostook, is hereby empowered to issue his warrant to some inhabitant of said town, directing him to notify the inhabitants thereof to meet at such time and place as he shall appoint, to choose such officers as other towns are empowered to choose at their annual meeting.

Meeting for choice of officers..

SECT. 3. The town hereby created shall take the effects belonging to Limestone plantation, and shall also assume all the obligations thereof.

Duties and liabilities of town.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 185.

An act to incorporate the officers and members of Forrest Hall Association.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. Hiram Stevens, O. N. Bradbury, George H. Haskell, Emery Johnson, John A. Larrabee, L. W. Drake, W. H. Murdock, A. H. Lindsay, Benjamin A. Burr and James T. Budge, their associates and successors, are hereby incorporated into a body politic by the name of Forrest Hall Association, to be established and have its place of business at Springfield, in the county of Penobscot, with power to sue and be sued, to have a common seal, and change the same, to make any by-laws for the management of their own affairs, not inconsistent with the laws of the state, to take and hold for charitable and benevolent purposes and uses, real estate to the value of three thousand dollars and personal property to the value of two thousand dollars, with the right to give, grant, bargain, sell and convey the same, and generally exercise all the rights and be subject to all the liabilities of corporations in this state created for charitable and benevolent purposes.
