Chapter 184.**CHAP. 184.**

An act to incorporate the town of Limestone.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. Limestone plantation, composed of letter E township in the first range, W. E. L. S., in Aroostook county, is hereby incorporated into a town by the name of Limestone, and the inhabitants of said town are hereby invested with all the powers, privileges, immunities and liabilities of other towns.

SECT. 2. Any justice of the peace within the county of Aroostook, is hereby empowered to issue his warrant to some inhabitant of said town, directing him to notify the inhabitants thereof to meet at such time and place as he shall appoint, to choose such officers as other towns are empowered to choose at their annual meeting.

Meeting for choice of officers..

SECT. 3. The town hereby created shall take the effects belonging to Limestone plantation, and shall also assume all the obligations thereof.

Duties and liabilities of town.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 185.

An act to incorporate the officers and members of Forrest Hall Association.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. Hiram Stevens, O. N. Bradbury, George H. Haskell, Emery Johnson, John A. Larrabee, L. W. Drake, W. H. Murdock, A. H. Lindsay, Benjamin A. Burr and James T. Budge, their associates and successors, are hereby incorporated into a body politic by the name of Forrest Hall Association, to be established and have its place of business at Springfield, in the county of Penobscot, with power to sue and be sued, to have a common seal, and change the same, to make any by-laws for the management of their own affairs, not inconsistent with the laws of the state, to take and hold for charitable and benevolent purposes and uses, real estate to the value of three thousand dollars and personal property to the value of two thousand dollars, with the right to give, grant, bargain, sell and convey the same, and generally exercise all the rights and be subject to all the liabilities of corporations in this state created for charitable and benevolent purposes.

CHAP. 186.

First meeting,
how called.

SECT. 2. The first meeting of said corporation shall be holden at such time and place and be notified in such manner as two-thirds of the persons herein named may direct.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 186.

An act authorizing a free bridge from Barter's island to the main land in Boothbay.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

May erect bridge
over Sheepscot
river.

SECT. 1. The town of Boothbay is hereby authorized to erect and maintain a free bridge across the east branch of the Sheepscot river in the town of Boothbay, from some point on the eastern shore of said island, between Samuel Lewis' point, so called, and the shore now or formerly owned by John Pinkham, the second, to the main land in said town ; the place of locating such bridge to be determined by said town at any legal meeting of the inhabitants thereof, acting under an appropriate article in the warrant for that purpose.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 187.

An act to incorporate the Portland Publishing Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Corporators.

SECT. 1. John Lynch, Frederick Robie, A. Franklin Gerrish, Leroy A. Foster and Asa E. Foster, their associates, successors and assigns, are constituted and made a body corporate and politic by the name of the Portland Publishing Company, with power by that name to sue and be sued, to have a common seal and alter the same, and with all the liabilities and immunities of like corporate bodies, under the laws of the state:

Capital stock
and shares.

SECT. 2. Said corporation may have a capital stock, not exceeding one hundred thousand dollars, to be divided into shares of such amount, as a majority of the corporators may determine.

Purpose.

SECT. 3. Said corporation is authorized to carry on the business of book binding, printing and publishing, in the city of Portland, and to print and to publish in said city, and sell there and
