Chapter 30.**CHAP. 30.**

Resolve providing for the payment of the salary of the late register of probate for Kennebec county.

Resolved, That the treasurer of Kennebec county be and he hereby is authorized and directed to pay to Sarah E. R. Burton daughter of Joseph Burton, deceased, the sum of four hundred and seventy-five dollars from any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, in full for the salary of said Joseph Burton as late register of probate for said county up to July first, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two.

Chapter 31.

Resolve establishing the valuation of Clinton Gore plantation in the county of Kennebec.

Resolved, That the number of polls set to Clinton Gore plantation, in the county of Kennebec, be fifty-two, and the value of estates twenty-eight thousand dollars, and that all state and county taxes shall be assessed accordingly.

Resolve in favor of Samuel W. Kimball.

Resolve for the relief of Byron Deane, John Hamilton, Reuben Hill and Alfred Hamilton from a forfeiture.
