Chapter 46.

Resolve amendatory to the "Resolve in relation to the Penebsoot tribe of Indians," approved February twenty-one, eighteen hundred and sixty-six.

Resolved, That the "Resolve in relation to the Penobscot Ch. 36, resolves of 1886, amended. tribe of Indians," approved February twenty-one, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

'Resolved, That the Penobscot tribe of Indians, hereafter Elections, when be allowed to elect by ballot, their governor, lieutenant-governor, and representatives to the legislature, on the second Tuesday of September, biennially, and that the old and new party, so called, be allowed to select from their respective parties, candidates for said offices, alternately, commencing with the old party, for the year eighteen hundred and sixtyseven, and the new party shall have no voice in the selection of candidates for said offices, and shall not vote in their election in those years when the old party is entitled to them; and the old party shall have no voice in the selection of candidates for said offices, and no vote in their election in those years when the new party is entitled to them; and it shall be the duty of the agent to preside at such election.'

Chapter 47.

Resolve laying a tax on the counties of the State for the years eighteen hundred and eighty-one and eighteen hundred and eighty-two.

Resolved, That the sums annexed to the counties in the County taxes. following schedule are hereby granted as a tax on each county respectively, to be appropriated, assessed, collected, and applied for the purpose of paying the debts and necessary expenses of the same, and other purposes ordered by law, for the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, to wit: Androscoggin, twenty-eight thousand dollars; Aroostook, sixteen thousand dollars; Cumberland, sixty-two thousand dollars; Franklin, seven thousand dollars; Hancock, eleven thousand five hundred dollars; Knox, eighteen thousand dollars; Kennebec, thirty-seven thousand dollars; Lincoln, nine thousand two hundred dollars; Oxford, ten thou-
