Trustees, number and qualification.

'Sect. II. All the corporate powers of this corporation shall be exercised by a board of trustees, all of whom shall reside in this state, whose number, not less than five, shall be determined by the stockholders at their annual meetings. Their term of office shall be for one year and until their successors shall have been chosen and qualified except that the trustees first chosen shall hold office until the next annual meeting of the stockholders. The affairs and powers of the corporation may, at the option of the stockholders, be entrusted to an executive board of five members, to be elected by the stockholders from the full board of trustees.'

Sect. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 340.

An Act additional to the Act of eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, Chapter four hundred and fifty-three, to establish a ferry across Penobscot River, between Ayer's Falls and Marsh Rips, as amended by the Act of eighteen hundred and eighty, Chapter two hundred and twenty-one.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Charter extended.

Sect. 1. Said charter shall be, and hereby is, continued in force ten years from and after the expiration of the present charter.

Sect. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.
