Chapter 184.

An Act to define the powers and duties of Superintendents of Schools.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 1. Superintendents of schools shall have the power and it shall be their duty to examine and certificate teachers and employ teachers subject to the approval of the superintending school committee.

Superintendents of schools shall examine teachers, subject to approval.

Section 2. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act, are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 185.

An Act to amend Section twenty-nine of Chapter one hundred and sixteen of the Revised Statutes, relating to Fees and Costs of Magistrates.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section twenty-nine of chapter one hundred and sixteen of the revised statutes is hereby amended by inserting at the end of the first sentence the words 'other than for copies and the entry fee in the appellat court.' Said section, as amended, will read as follows:

Section 29 of chapter 116, R. S., amended.

'Section 29. No trial justice, or judge or other officer of any municipal or police court, shall demand or receive any fees for entertaining an appeal or taking a recognizance to prosecute it, in a criminal case, other than for copies and entry fee in the appellat court. The legal fees therefor may be taxed in the bill of costs, and certified and paid like other fees.'
