Chapter 383.

An Act to appropriate moneys for the Expenditures of Government for the year one thousand nine hundred and nine.

Emer-
gency.

Whereas, the appropriation of moneys for the maintenance of several branches of the state government and its institutions is an emergency measure immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health or safety, now therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows :

Section 1. In order to provide for the several acts and resolves of the legislature requiring the payment of money from the state treasury, and also to provide in part for the necessary expenditures of government, for the current fiscal year one thousand nine hundred and nine, the following sums are hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the state treasury, and, except where otherwise especially provided, the governor with the advice and consent of the council, is hereby authorized at any time prior to the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and ten, to draw his warrant on the state treasurer for the same.

PASSAMAQUODDY INDIANS.

For the Passamaquoddy tribe of Indians, as provided by chapter two hundred forty-eight, of the resolves of nineteen hundred and nine, fourteen thousand four hundred and thirteen dollars . . . 14,413 00

PENOBSCOT INDIANS.

For the Penobscot tribe of Indians as provided by chapter two hundred forty-nine, resolves of nineteen hundred and nine, nineteen thousand three hundred seventy-six dollars and twenty cents . . . 19,376 20

SEA AND SHORE FISHERIES.

For pay of wardens and other incidental expenses as provided by chapter one hundred sixteen, section ten, revised statutes, fifteen thousand dollars 15,000 00

STATE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

For normal schools and training school as provided by chapter fifteen, section one hundred and fifteen revised statutes, forty-three thousand dollars 43,000 00

For superintendence of towns comprising school unions, as provided by chapter fifteen, sections forty-one and forty-five, revised statutes, as amended by chapter one hundred and one, public laws of nineteen hundred and seven, thirty-nine thousand dollars 39,000 00

For schooling of children in unorganized townships as provided by chapter fifteen, section ninety-seven, revised statutes, seven thousand dollars . . . 7,000 00

STATE TREASURER.

For county taxes on wild lands, as provided by chapter nine, section forty-one, revised statutes, as amended by chapter sixty-nine, public laws, nineteen hundred and five, fifty thousand dollars . . . 50,000 00

For dog licenses refunded, as provided by chapter four, section fifty-six, revised statutes, thirty-two thousand one hundred eight dollars and thirty-nine cents 32,108 39

For interest on lands reserved for public uses, as provided by chapter seven, section sixteen, revised statutes, eleven thousand dollars 11,000 00

Amounting to the sum of three hundred sixty-nine thousand, four hundred eighteen dollars and twenty-one cents\$369,418 21

Section 2. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 384.

An Act to establish the Old Orchard Park System.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. If the legal voters in the town of Old Orchard in the county of York so vote at a meeting legally called and held, said town is hereby authorized to issue bonds in the sum of fifty thousand dollars for the purpose of carrying out the provisions contained in the following sections of this act. Said bonds to be of such denomination and to mature at such time not later than forty years as the town shall determine. Said bonds shall mature at five-year periods and during each year the town shall set aside an amount so that at the end of any five-year period the amount so set aside will pay the principal of the bonds maturing at the end of that five-year period, and they shall also set aside each year a sum equal to the interest upon the bonds for each year, and shall deposit the same in some approved savings institution paying interest.

Authorized to issue bonds.

—denomination and maturity of bonds.

Section 2. The proceeds of the sale of said bonds shall be used for the following purposes: First, for the purpose of purchasing or acquiring by legal process, under the right of eminent domain, a parcel or parcels of land with any buildings thereon, situated in the town of Old Orchard, and bordering upon the Atlantic Ocean on the southeast, on the northwest by land of the Boston and Maine railroad and land used for a small park, controlled by said Boston and Maine railroad, or by Grand Avenue; second, for erecting thereon public bathing pavilions and sanitary accommodations therein, and for improving said lot or lots as a public park, with suitable improvements for the convenience of the public; third, for the purpose of building, repairing and maintaining streets and sidewalks within

Purposes for which proceeds of bonds shall be used.
