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**Chapter 24.**

CHAP. 24

An Act to Close Socatean Stream to Power Boats.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any steam boat or motor boat, by whatever power propelled, to navigate the waters of Socatean stream or bay, adjacent and tributary to Moosehead lake, above the point near the outlet of said stream where fishing buoys are now located.

Socatean stream closed to power boats.

Section 2. This act shall not apply to steam boats or motor boats used in connection with lumbering operations.

—shall not apply.

Section 3. Whoever violates the provisions of this act shall pay a fine of twenty dollars and costs for each offense.

Penalty.

**Chapter 25.**

An Act to Regulate the Employment of Subordinates by Legislative Committees.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

Section 1. The Governor and Council shall, by a general order, to be revised at the beginning of each session of the Legislature, determine which of the legislative committees may have the service of subordinates and in what capacities, and shall fix the compensation to be paid to such subordinates. They shall also from time to time, during the session of the Legislature, when found necessary, authorize other necessary assistance to the committees.

Governor and Council shall regulate employment of subordinates.

Section 2. No legislative committee, or officials chosen by such committee shall employ clerks, stenographers, or other clerical help, at the expense of the State, until so authorized by the Governor and Council, and the subordinates employed by such authority shall receive no other compensation from the State, than that fixed by the Governor and Council.

—shall not employ clerical help unless authorized.
