changes in the personnel of a partnership or in the principals, officers, directors, or managing agents of any dealer, may be made at any time upon written application to the commissioner, accompanied by statement of the facts necessitating the change. Upon the issue of the amended certificates, the original certificate and the certified copies thereof outstanding shall be promptly surrendered to the commissioner.

Public utilities whose securities have been authorized by the Maine public utilities commission shall be registered as dealers in such securities upon written application and payment of the fee prescribed in section one hundred seventy-six without filing any data or information other than an affidavit showing the approval of such securities by the Maine public utilities commission. Said registration shall cover any further issue of securities of said public utilities authorized by the Maine public utilities commission during the period that said registration or renewal thereof is in force.'

Chapter 249.**AN ACT Relating to Bounty on Porcupines.**

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Porcupine bounties; limit. Not more than five thousand dollars a year shall be expended for porcupine bounties.

Chapter 250.**AN ACT Relating to State Geologist.**

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 49, sec. 53, relating to state geologist, amended. Section fifty-three of chapter forty-nine of the revised statutes is hereby amended by striking out said section and inserting in place thereof the following section:

'Sec. 53. Compensation; expenses. The state geologist shall be paid ten dollars per day and expenses while actively engaged in the performance of his duties. He may employ assistants, purchase material and publish documents for which the state shall pay out of funds provided for the department.'
