CHAP. 77

Chapter 75.

RESOLVE, In Favor of the Central Maine Sanatorium for the Construction and Equipment of an Additional Building for Patients.

Central Maine Sanatorium, appropriation for building. Resolved: That there be, and hereby is appropriated for the Central Maine Sanatorium the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars for the construction and equipment of an additional building for patients, said sum to be available from surplus revenue funds.

Approved April 2, 1931.

Chapter 76.

RESOLVE, In Favor of the Central Maine Sanatorium for the Enlargement of the Nurses Home.

Central Maine Sanatorium; appropriation for nurses home. Resolved: That there be, and hereby is appropriated for the Central Maine Sanatorium the sum of fifteen thousand dollars for the enlargement and equipment of the Nurses Home, said sum to be available from surplus revenue funds.

Approved April 2, 1931.

Chapter 77.

RESOLVE, Relating to the Acceptance by the People of the State of Maine of the Greek Flag Presented by the President of the Greek Republic.

WHEREAS, the year 1930 marked the one hundredth anniversary of the Independence of Greece, and

WHEREAS, during the struggle for independence the Greeks appealed to the United States for moral support, and

WHEREAS, President Monroe, Daniel Webster, Henry Clay, Edward Everett and Dr. Samuel Howe raised their voices in the Senate of the United States and outside of Government circles in behalf of the liberties of a people to whom the entire civilized world owes an everlasting debt of gratitude, and

WHEREAS, last August American Legionnaires visited Athens to pay tribute to the memory of the American patriots who struggled for Greek
