CHAP. 14

Sheepscot river, so-called, within the town of Boothbay. This shall not interfere with any law relating to taking shellfish for bait for fishermen.

Whoever violates the provisions hereof shall for each offense be punished by a fine of not more than \$10, or by imprisonment for not more than 30 days.

Chapter 12

RESOLVE, Relating to the Taking of Clams in Bluehill.

Taking of clams in Bluehill, regulated. Resolved: That the commissioner of sea and shore fisheries be, and hereby is, directed to issue a rule and regulation forbidding any person not a resident of the town of Bluehill, in the county of Hancock, to dig clams for commercial purposes within the limits of said town. Any person taking clams contrary to the provisions of this rule and regulation shall be punished for each offense by a fine of not more than \$25, or by imprisonment for not more than 30 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Approved March 4, 1939.

Chapter 13

RESOLVE, in Favor of Allen C. Reed and Warren Reed, of Boothbay Harbor.

Allen C. Reed and Warren Reed; compensated. Resolved: That there be, and hereby is, appropriated the sum of \$25 to be paid to Allen C. Reed and Warren Reed, of Boothbay Harbor, to compensate them for towing a dead body to shore; said sum to be paid from the general funds of the state.

Chapter 14

RESOLVE, Relating to the Digging of Clams in the Town of Brooksville.

Digging of clams in town of Brooksville, regulated. Resolved: That the commissioner of sea and shore fisheries be, and hereby is, directed to issue a rule and regulation prohibiting any person, not an inhabitant of

the town of Brooksville, from digging clams for commercial purposes within said town. Whoever violates any provision of this rule and regulation shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$25 or by imprisonment for not more than 30 days.

Chapter 15

RESOLVE, Relating to the Digging of Clams in the Town of Sedgwick.

Digging of clams in town of Sedgwick, regulated. Resolved: That the commissioner of sea and shore fisheries be, and hereby is, directed to issue a rule and regulation prohibiting any person, not an inhabitant of the town of Sedgwick, from digging clams for commercial purposes within said town. Whoever violates any provision of this rule and regulation shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$25 or by imprisonment for not more than 30 days.

RESOLVE, Relating to the Digging of Clams in the Town of Brooklin.

Digging of clams in town of Brooklin, regulated. Resolved: That the commissioner of sea and shore fisheries be, and hereby is, directed to issue a rule and regulation prohibiting any person, not an inhabitant of the town of Brooklin, from digging clams for commercial purposes within said town.

Chapter 17

RESOLVE, Appropriating Money for the Study and Control of the European Spruce Sawfly.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, the adjoining Canadian provinces have severe infestations of a European Spruce Sawfly which has heavily damaged the spruce stands in said provinces; and
