RESOLVES, 1953**CHAP. 128**

Whereas, Maine needs a terminal airport for airlines, cargo carriers and feeder line systems to serve the entire state; and

Whereas, the Civil Aeronautics Administration has indicated a willingness to expend federal funds as the federal share of the project; and

Whereas, such federal funds will be available only until June 30, 1953; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

Portland municipal airport construction; appropriation for. Resolved: That there be, and hereby is, appropriated from the unappropriated surplus of the general fund the sum of \$250,000 for such construction at the Portland municipal airport as may be recommended by the aeronautics commission and approved by the governor and council. The expenditure shall be under the supervision of the aeronautics commission. Such expenditure as may be authorized by this resolve shall be contingent upon the fact that not more than 25% of the project cost shall be paid for by funds herein appropriated. It is the intent of the legislature to so limit the use of state funds as to require that federal funds and other funds shall finance 75% of the cost of the project; and be it further

Resolved: That this appropriation shall not lapse, but shall be carried forward to the 1954-1955 fiscal year.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 128

RESOLVE, Regulating Fishing in Stearns Pond and Tributaries in the County of Oxford.

Fishing in Stearns pond and tributaries, regulated. Resolved: That the commissioner of inland fisheries and game be, and hereby is, authorized and directed to issue a rule and regulation closing the tributaries to Stearns

pond in Sweden, in the county of Oxford, to the taking of smelts every other year and establishing a bag limit on Stearns pond of one bass per boat, to be taken by fly fishing only, during the month of June.

Chapter 129

RESOLVE, Relating to Ice Fishing in Peabody Pond, Cumberland County.

Peabody pond; ice fishing in. Resolved: That the commissioner of inland fisheries and game be, and hereby is, authorized and directed to issue a rule and regulation to open Peabody pond, Cumberland county, to ice fishing during the month of February of each year, to all fish except trout and salmon.

Chapter 130

RESOLVE, Relating to Post War Public Works Reserve Fund and Appropriating Moneys for the Women's Reformatory.

Balance of Post War Public Works Reserve Fund. Resolved: That the sum of \$15,515.13, being the unexpended balance of the Post War Public Works Reserve Fund, be, and hereby is, transferred to the unappropriated surplus of the general fund; and be it further

Appropriation for women's reformatory. Resolved: That the sum of \$15,000 be, and hereby is, appropriated from the unappropriated surplus of the general fund for the purpose of repairs and improvements in the laundry at the women's reformatory at Skowhegan. The sum so expended shall be as recommended by the commissioner of institutional service and approved by the governor and council.
