## Chapter 17

RESOLVE, Designating Abbot Village Bridge as "The Page-Carr Bridge."

Bridge designated as "The Page-Carr Bridge." Resolved: That the new bridge constructed during 1956-1957 on relocated State Route #15 over the Piscataquis River at Abbot Village be officially named and referred to as "The Page-Carr Bridge" in memory of Lewis Page and Clifton Carr, Jr.

## Chapter 18

RESOLVE, Refunding Motor Vehicle Fees to Certain Canadian Residents.

Canadian residents; reimbursed. Resolved: That there be appropriated from the General Highway Fund the sum of \$80.13 to pay the persons herein-after named, the total sums set opposite their respective names, being a full and final settlement of the claims against the State of Maine for motor vehicle excise taxes, registration fees and operators' licenses paid under a mistaken interpretation of the law.

## Chapter 19

RESOLVE, Regulating Fishing in Parmachenee Lake, Parmachenee and Lynchtown, Oxford County.

Resolves, 1955, c. 104, amended. Resolved: That the 27th paragraph of that part designated "Oxford County" of chapter 104 of the resolves of 1955, be amended to read as follows:

'Parmachenee Lake, Parmachenee and Lynchtown. ~~Fly fishing and trolling with artificial flies only.~~ Use or possession of live fish as bait prohibited. Daily limit 5 fish.'
