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'The board may adopt rules and regulations consistent with the law governing the care, preparation, transportation, cremation, burial or disposition of dead human bodies, and governing embalming and funeral directing; ~~provided that no, including licensing and registration of apprentices and mortuary assistants.~~ No such rule or regulation shall require that an embalmer be permanently employed by a funeral director. Such rules and regulations shall not become effective until approved by the Department of Health and Welfare.'

Sec. 2. R. S., c. 25, § 200, amended. The 2nd sentence of section 200 of chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes, as amended by chapter 23 of the public laws of 1957, is further amended to read as follows:

'Any person holding an embalmer's license or certificate of registration or funeral director's license issued under ~~the provisions of~~ this or any other law, may have the same renewed by making and filing with the secretary of said board an application therefor within 30 days preceding the expiration of his or her license or certificate of registration, upon blanks prescribed by said board, and upon the payment of a renewal fee of \$4 for an embalmer's license, \$4 for a funeral director's license, \$6 for a combination embalmer's and funeral director's license ~~and, \$2 for an apprentice's license and \$2 for a mortuary assistant's license.'~~

Chapter 219

AN ACT Prohibiting Sale or Purchase of Military Decorations.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 14, § 84-A, additional. Chapter 14 of the Revised Statutes is amended by adding a new section 84-A, to read as follows:

'**Sec. 84-A. Sale or purchase of military decorations prohibited.** It shall be unlawful for any person to expose for sale, offer for sale, sell, pawn or pledge, or for any person to buy, purchase or loan money on any military badge, button, decoration or other insignia issued under the regulations of the army, air force, navy or marine corps of the United States or the National Guard. Whoever violates this section shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$20, or by imprisonment for not more than 30 days, or by both.'

Chapter 220

AN ACT Relating to Interference with or Destruction of Transit Points and Monuments.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. R. S., c. 124, § 10-A, additional. Chapter 124 of the Revised Statutes is amended by adding a new section 10-A, to read as follows:

'Sec. 10-A. Negligent interference, removal or destruction of monuments. Whoever negligently disturbs, removes or destroys any lawfully established transit point, reference point, stake, plug, hub, guard-stake, bench mark, pipe, iron, concrete post, stone post or other monument of any railroad, highway, public utility or other engineering location or survey or any such monument marking the bounds of public or private property shall be liable to the person injured in a civil action for the amount of damage done, which shall be measured by the cost of replacing such monument, including necessary engineering services.'

Sec. 2. R. S., c. 131, § 20, amended. Section 20 of chapter 131 of the Revised Statutes, as amended by section 455 of chapter 317 of the public laws of 1961, is further amended to read as follows:

'Sec. 20. Interference, removal or destruction of transit points, etc. Whoever willfully or maliciously disturbs, removes or destroys any lawfully established transit point, reference point, stake, plug, hub, guard-stake, bench mark, pipe, iron, concrete post, stone post or other monument of any railroad, highway, public utility or other engineering location or survey or any such monument marking the bounds of public or private property shall be punished by a fine of not more than ~~\$25~~ \$100 or by imprisonment for not more than 30 days; and in addition thereto shall be liable in a civil action for the amount of damage done, which shall be measured by the costs of replacing such monument, including necessary engineering services.'

Chapter 221

AN ACT to Revise Certain Motor Vehicle Laws.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. R. S., c. 22, § 16, sub-§ V, repealed. Subsection V of section 16 of chapter 22 of the Revised Statutes is repealed as follows:

~~'V. Motorcycle side ears \$5 each'~~

Sec. 2. R. S., c. 22, § 26, amended. The next to the last sentence of section 26 of chapter 22 of the Revised Statutes is amended to read as follows:

'Extra registration plates shall be furnished to replace lost or mutilated plates for ~~75c~~ \$1 each.'

Sec. 3. R. S., c. 22, § 26-A, amended. Section 26-A of chapter 22 of the Revised Statutes, as enacted by section 5 of chapter 200 of the public laws of 1955 and as amended, is further amended by adding at the end a new sentence to read as follows:

'Replacement registration plates shall be furnished to replace lost or mutilated plates for \$1 each.'
