## Chapter 130

### AN ACT Relating to Killing Rodents in Orchards.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

R. S., T. 17, § 1094, amended. The last sentence of section 1094 of Title 17 of the Revised Statutes is amended to read as follows:

Mice Rodents may be killed in orchards or plantations by the use of any poison or poisonous substance that is recommended by the United States Bureau of Biological Survey and used according to the recommendations of the Agricultural Extension Service.

Effective October 1, 1969

## Chapter 131

### AN ACT Relating to Presidential Electors at Large and From Districts.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

Sec. 1. R. S., T. 21, § 1181-A, additional. Title 21 of the Revised Statutes is amended by adding a new section 1181-A, to read as follows:

#### § 1181-A. Representation

There shall be chosen a Presidential Elector from each congressional district and 2 at large.

Sec. 2. R. S., T. 21, § 1184, sub-§ 1-A, additional. Section 1184 of Title 21 of the Revised Statutes is amended by adding a new subsection 1-A, to read as follows:

1-A. Presidential Electors. The Presidential Electors at large shall cast their ballots for President and Vice-President of the political party which received the largest number of votes in the State. The Presidential Electors of each congressional district shall cast their ballots for President and Vice-President of the political party which received the largest number of votes in each congressional district.
