PUBLIC LAWS, 1979 CHAP, 184

designate 5 members to serve for one year, 4 members to serve for 2 years and 4 members to serve for 3 years. Thereafter, all members shall be appointed for 3 vears.

- 3. Chairman. The committee shall select a chairman from among its members.
- 4. Expenses. The committee members shall be reimbursed for their expenses, but shall receive no other compensation for service on the committee.
- 5. Nonvoting representative. The department's consultant for the fire service training program shall be a nonvoting representative of the department at the committee meetings.
- Sec. 3. Terms of office. The terms of office of those persons appointed as members of the advisory committee pursuant to Title 20, section 2552, prior to the enactment of this Act shall expire on the effective date of this Act.

CHAPTER 183

H. P. 422 — L. D. 517

AN ACT to Amend Existing Stumpage Allowance to the Passamaquoddy Indian Tribe.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

22 MRSA § 4834, 2nd ¶, as repealed and replaced by PL 1969, c. 217, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:

At the end of each fiscal year all net income from the sale of timber and grass from Indian Township shall be distributed in equal amounts to the Passamaquoddy Tribal Councils of Pleasant Point and Indian Township.

AN ACT Relating to Native Farm Produce.
