#### CHAPTER 92

S. P. 695 — L. D. 1831

AN ACT to Expand the State's Industrial Development Promotion Program.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

**Appropriation.** The following funds are appropriated from the General Fund to carry out the purposes of this Act.

1980-1981

#### STATE DEVELOPMENT OFFICE

All Other \$100,000

These funds shall be used for an industrial development promotion program.

#### CHAPTER 93

S. P. 719 — L. D. 1869

AN ACT Making Supplemental Appropriations from the General Fund for the Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 1980 to the Department of the Attorney General for the Defense of Land Claims Asserted by the Passamaquoddy Tribe and the Penolscot Nation.

**Emergency preamble.** Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, the 90-day period may not terminate until after the beginning of the next fiscal year; and

Whereas, certain obligations and expenses incident to the operation of the Department of Attorney General are now due and payable; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,
