3. Exception. Smoking may be permitted in jury rooms, provided all members present have given their consent for others to smoke.

CHAPTER 227

H.P. 1111 - L.D. 1456

AN ACT to Protect the Quality of Lobsters.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

12 MRSA §6441 is enacted to read:

§6441. Plugged lobsters

The commissioner, in accordance with section 6191, may adopt regulations prohibiting the possession of plugged lobsters, provided that he has determined that these regulations will not adversely affect lobster importation.

CHAPTER 228

H.P. 1135 - L.D. 1488

AN ACT to Revise the Salaries of Certain County Officers.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, it has become necessary to revise the salaries of certain county officials; and

Whereas, these revisions are vitally necessary at the earliest possible time this law can become effective; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of
