CHAPTER 287

H.P. 858 - L.D. 1108

AN ACT to Strengthen the Penalties for Misuse of Narcotics by Health Professionals.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

22 MRSA §2380, as repealed and replaced by PL 1975, c. 499, §48, is amended to read:

§2380: Violation of provisions

Any conduct in violation of this chapter, other than conduct which is made criminal by Title 17-A, chapter 45, or any other provision of Maine law, is a civil violation for which a forfeiture of not more than \$1,000 nor less than \$50 may be adjudged.

CHAPTER 288

H.P. 577 - L.D. 725

AN ACT to Clarify the Maine Motor Vehicle Habitual Offender Statute.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

29 MRSA §2298, first ¶, as amended by PL 1979, c. 541, Pt. B, §34, is further amended to read:

It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any motor vehicle on a public way, as defined in Title 17-A, section 505, subsection 2, in this State while the revocation prohibiting its operation remains in effect. Any person found to be an habitual offender under this chapter, or former chapter 18, who is thereafter convicted of operating a motor vehicle in this State while the revocation prohibiting operation is in effect shall have committed a Class C crime.
