REPORT OF THE JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION ON ITS REVIEW OF THE RULES OF THE MAINE STATE MUSEUM

On February 8, 1988, the Joint Standing Committee on Education received notice from the Executive Director of the Legislative Council that an application for legislative review of certain rules pertaining to the Maine State Museum had been received. In due course, the application was reviewed and found to contain the signatures of at least 100 registered voters as required by 5 MRSA \$1112. Following review of the application, the committee unanimously determined that the public interest would be served by legislative review of the rules.

The rules in question are adopted jointly by the Museum Director and the Maine State Museum Commission. They are Chapter 502, Reproduction of Museum Collections, and Chapter 506, Public Access to and Use of Museum Collections. The rules are promulgated under the authority of 27 MRSA §83, Powers, Duties of the Maine State Museum Commission and §85, Powers and Duties of Museum Director. Section 85 lists among others the following powers:

- 3. Rules. To promulgate such rules as necessary to effectuate the purposes of this chapter. No unreasonable restrictions or limitations shall be imposed on the use of museum records or objects open to public inspection...;
- 8. Preservation and restoration. To preserve, identify, catalogue, document and safeguard the collection of the museum;
- 10. Information. To provide reference services to individuals and local historical, natural history, scientific and other groups and societies interested in museum activities;

The application contained a number of specific suggestions for changes in the rules. For simplicity sake, the thrust of the reasons for review presented in the application can be summarized as follows:

- A. The rules exceed the rule-making authority granted in Title 27. §§83 and 85 to the Maine State Museum Commission and the Director of the Maine State Museum.
- B. Even if they are within the authority granted, the rules are unreasonable in their effect in that they deny access to museum collections which are in the possession of a State agency and are intended for the benefit of all the people of the State.

- C. The rules discriminate between <u>scholars</u> on the one hand who are permitted to use museum collection <u>documents</u> to extract ideas and records for their "academic" work and <u>craftsmen</u> on the other hand who are more limited in their access to <u>artifacts</u> to make measurements, drawings and photographs for use in their craft.
- D. Parts of the rules are in conflict with or preempted by federal copyright law.

On April 14, the Joint Standing Committee on Education held a meeting to review the rules. During that meeting, Mr. Paul Rivard, Museum Director, and Mr. Lloyd Battles, spokesperson for the applicants, were each granted the opportunity to make expanded statements of their positions to the committee.

On April 20, the committee met again for the purposes of taking action on the application. The following motion was made by Rep. Handy and seconded by Rep. O'Gara: That the Joint Standing Committee on Education following review of Maine State Museum Rules - chapters 502 and 506 as required by 5 MRSA Chapter 377-A finds those rules to be in order and further finds that no legislative action is warranted with respect to those rules. The motion was unanimously supported by members of the committee present.
