



The National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL) is pleased to announce that technical assistance under the Child Care/Early Childhood Education Project will be available to six states during the upcoming year--September 1988 through August 1989. The project supports collaboration within legislatures in the development of both child care and early childhood education policies and is funded by the Carnegie Corporation of New York. The focus of the project is to assist state legislatures in designing coordinated policies to meet the educational and day care needs of young children in order to minimize duplication and fragmentation of services. A more detailed project description is enclosed for your information.

During the past three years, 10 states have received technical assistance--Alaska, Connecticut, Iowa, Kentucky, Minnesota, New Hampshire, New York, Rhode Island, Tennessee, and Vermont. Activities have ranged from providing expert testimony before legislative committees and assistance in drafting reports to coordinating statewide conferences.

Applications for technical assistance will soon be mailed to all chairs of education and human services committees. NCSL will require your support for any technical assistance activity in your state. The due date for applications and letters of support is September 30, 1988.

#### Please respond to the following questions:

- I. On which child care and early childhood education issues are you interested in receiving technical assistance? Please identify and briefly describe each issue.
  - + Implementation of child-centered developmentally appropriate preschool and early elementary school curriculum (consistent with recommendations of the report of the Legislature's Special Commission on Early Childhood Education and Development to be issued in December 1988).
  - + Development of a comprehensive long-range (5-10 yr.) plan to meet the State's child care needs, focusing especially on child care programs with a developmentally appropriate education component to meet the needs of at risk children ages birth to 5.
  - + Coordinate (1) family education and training to provide information on the developmental stages and needs of children, (2) family support group services for parents of children likely to be at risk of school failure and (3) efforts to expand parent's involvement in their child's education.

- II. What form of technical assistance would be most helpful in addressing these issues? (e.g. assistance with planning or conducting hearings, conferences, or workshops; access to expert consultation; policy analysis and recommendations on pending or potential legislation; assistance in developing a strategy for studying the issues; research on methods other states use to address the issues, etc.).
  - Assistance in conducting a series of 3 regional conferences to disseminate current information and establish broad based support among school officials, social service and educational associations and agencies, the public, and legislators for:
    - quality preschool programs for at-risk children,
    - efforts to coordinate the transition from preschool to public school,
    - developmentally appropriate early elementary curriculum; and
    - family involvement in the development of children.
  - + Outside consultation and policy analysis to assist in development of a long-range child care plan and legislative initiative which promote the coordination of the educational and child care needs of children and families at both the state and local level.
  - + Several recent legislative initiatives (see discussion in IV below) have addressed various early childhood education and child care issues. The purpose of the conferences and development of the long range plan is to build public support. and coordinate efforts in those areas by stimulating discussion and cooperation.
- III. How will Education and Human Services Committee chairs and members work together on this technical assistance?

Three members of the two committees (including 2 who are also members of the Special Commission on Early Childhood Development and Education) have collaborated closely on the development of this proposal. That relationship will continue by the establishment of an ad hoc select commission consisting of representatives of the 2 legislative committees and other interested parties to oversee and coordinate implementation of technical assistance should it be awarded. There is a committment from the chairs of each of the 2 committees (3 of the 4 are likely to

continue as chairs next session) to work with the ad hoc committee to coordinate the conferences soon after the start of the next session in January and for the establishment of a study commission next summer to work on the development of the long range plan.

IV. What evidence exists to suggest that progress will be made on child care and early childhood education issues in the next session of the Legislature?

A great deal of interest currently exists in Maine in the areas of child care and early elementary education. There have been a large number of related major study efforts, legislative initiatives and University projects developed in the last two years. The work of the Special Commission on Early Childhood Development and Education mentioned above is one example. major committment to child care made by both the present and previous administrations. This committment includes additional state funding for Head Start programs and Title XX child care centers. As part of the current Governor's economic development strategy, the State has funded the establishment of 6 regional Child Care Development Centers and Project ASPIRE designed to provide coordinated services (including child care) to welfare recipients to encourage and prepare them to enter the workforce. educational programs to provide services to at risk youth and for young children with special needs have also been enacted. In addition, the University of Maine System has initiated measures to provide parenting skills training and to develop day care programs for employees.

The problem is that each of the programs has its particular approach to a related problem resulting in a lack of coordination and program overlap. Legislators on the 2 committes recognize the need for a comprehensive approach which will maximize the impact of available dollars on the targeted population. It is likely an additional amount of state resources will be available next session. What is needed is a consolidated effort by various constituencies to build support for and coordinate their efforts in order to use available resources to provide services to the appropriate persons in an efficient manner.

V. When would you like technical assistance activities to be conducted in your state?

Two phases:

Phase I - in the early part of the upcoming legislative session (January - February 1989) to build consensus behind the early childhood education and development report

Phase II - (post session (June - September 1989) to provide consultation and analysis in the initial stages of the development of a comprehensive child care plan for the state.

Dear Senator Pray and Speaker Martin:

We learned of the application for a grant from the National Conference of State Legislature's (NCSL) Child Care/Early Childhood Education project by phone. This proposal was submitted by Senator Estes, Representatives Clark and Handy. Since we did not have the project before us, we could not comment or make suggestions.

Therefore, we wish to point out that the Department of Human Services' Office of Child Care Coordination, established by the Legislature in 1985, serves as state government's focus on child care issues including long-range planning. As this office was not consulted in the development of this proposal, we want to ensure that Senator Estes and Representative Clark work with the Office of Child Care Coordination on the child care planning component should this proposal be implemented.

The Office of Child Care Coordination works with a statewide advisory committee representing a broad-based constituency with a considerable amount of knowledge and expertise on child care issues. We encourage you to work together with them on the development of a child care system that meets the needs of Maine citizens and can serve as a model for the nation.
