The meeting of the Legislative Council was called to order in the Council Chambers by the Council Chair, Speaker Martin, at 12:20 p.m.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The summary of the Council's January 3, 1989, meeting was approved and placed on file. (Motion by Sen. Dutremble; second by Rep. Marsano; unanimous).

SPECIAL GUESTS

Speaker Martin recognized the Honorable Samuel Shapiro, State Treasurer, who, in turn, introduced Ms. Claire Cohen, Vice-President and Managing Director for State Ratings, Moody's Investment Services. Ms. Cohen was accompanied by two associates who work with bond ratings for local communities in Maine and the Maine Municipal Bond Bank.

At the invitation of the Chair, Ms. Cohen addressed the Council briefly. She noted that Maine had succeeded in returning its rating to AA-1 which puts Maine "at the top of the rating spectrum." Only 13 states that issue general obligation bonds have ratings of AA-1 or higher (AAA). Questions from Council members focused on whether the State of Maine could take specific steps to improve Maine's rating. Ms. Cohen replied in the negative, noting that Moody's tracks economic and other indicators in Maine on a continual basis. She reported that the next formal review of Maine's rating would be at the time of the state's next issue of bonds under its existing bonding authority, which will occur in March, 1989.

Speaker Martin expressed appreciation to Ms. Cohen and her associates on behalf of the entire Council for meeting with the Council.

Senator Clark requested that Council members discuss an issue that had been raised during the meeting of Committee Chairs earlier in the day. She noted that the Governor's letters of nomination are often received by the Senate on Fridays late in the afternoon. The effect of this is to reduce the 20-day statutory period that the Legislature has to convene a public hearing on the nomination to 17 or 18 days. She asked if those Council members who were of the Governor's party would be willing to convey this concern to the Governor. Rep. Webster reported that she would be happy to do this.

Dear John:

In the course of my work over the past 3 months with the State Capitol Commission and the Supreme Judicial Court Commission, I have discovered several disturbing circumstances, some of which are alarming in proportion or urgency. These developments will likely necessitate the prompt action of the legislature and therefore I bring them to your attention.

I have reviewed the master plan, (attached, passed by the Legislature pursuant to Private and Special Law 1967, chapter 458 and enacted into law under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 1, section 814, by the 104th Legislature,) and note that it:

- A. has existed for over 19 years but has seldom, if ever, been followed;
- B. has not been reviewed periodically or updated every 5 years as the originating commission recommended; and
- C. has no provisions for present day developments or the needs of the future.

Since a master plan has direct bearing on the activities of both my commissions, plus most other activities within the capitol complex, it is imperative that a blue print be created and enforced as directed by the Legislature and that there be coordination of all development activities and ample notice to all parties concerned which is not the case at present.

This unfortunate situation offers an opportunity for you and the legislative leadership to set the course for the future of the Capitol complex. By developing a comprehensive program for the orderly and aesthetic development of future state buildings, structures and grounds in the Capitol area of the City of Augusta, you will be viewed as foresighted builders.

Among the issues which must be addressed immediately are the following.

- 1. A February 28th deadline has been imposed for the proposed sale of city land bordering Capitol Park.
- 2. The Naval Training Center which is part of the aforementioned parcel, is leased from the city. The facility is presently under utilized and the lease will soon expire.
- 3. Discontinued use of Guilford Railroad Line means an option to purchase it before resale for parking or fiber optic transmission lines. Capitol grounds originally ran to the river edge and there's a possibility of restoring State ownership and use of that land.
- 4. Sale of Department of Transportation Highway garage buildings and grounds on Capitol Street to the State Retirement System for investment and private development has been proposed.
- 5. Proposed construction of new Department of Motor Vehicles building should be put on hold pending several options.
- 6. Master plan needs to be updated and adopted by the Legislature. (See old plan attached)
- 7. Master plan needs to be expanded to include state land on east bank of the Kennebec (including the US Arsenal and AMHI grounds). The statutory description will also need to be changed.

- 8. Capitol Park should be under the Capitol Commission as the park and the State House are inseparable. Statutory authority should be revised to include the park or left under the Capitol Planning Commission but subject to review by the Capitol Commission.
- 9. A moratorium should be imposed by the Legislature on all sales, purchases, leases and construction in and bordering the capitol area until the master plan is updated. No development should be allowed without being integrated into an overall plan accepted by the Legislature.
- 10. The Legislature needs to oversee these eratic activities. It is disgraceful that the statutory structure and authority is not in place to prevent the invasion of developers and for profit schemes which would buy State land, build on it and then lease the space back to the State at a premium.
- 11. At present there is no coordination between commissions groups or agencies; each has limited self interest. No person has been authorized or designated to coordinate all these activities. Without authority the Director of the Capitol Commission cannot effectively assist the Legislature in further pursuing these matters.

Each of these items has a major impact on the overall development of the Capitol Complex. I urge you to look at these in greater detail at your earliest possible chance. I would welcome the opportunity to take the lead in this.



Dear John:

The State Capitol Commission is agreed that there should be integration of the State Capitol building and Capitol Park in the future and hence with the land that boarders on Capitol Park. This concept existed early in the history of the State House and is confirmed by the Olmsted Plan of 1920. (attached.)

In view of this and the City of Augusta's, urgent proposal to sell the city owned portion of Capitol Park, the State Capitol Commission unanimously voted the following motion while meeting January 5, 1989 at Augusta:

"Because the Augusta Capitol Park is so important to the Maine State Capitol Park and being fearful that the State will be foreclosed from appropriate use of the Augusta Capitol Park by development while issues are being studied, the State Capitol Commission recommends to the 114th Legislature that Augusta Capitol Park be tied up by purchase, option or otherwise for potential State ownership."

The Commission appreciates the serious commitment you have already made in protecting this area. In so doing we offer our full support to that position, knowing it will


ultimately cost taxpayers money, that the integrity of the site of the State Capitol Building must be protected, and the Captiol should remain the dominent object in the neighborhood.
