MALPRACTICE LIABILITY INSURANCE PREMIUM REPORT OUTLINE

1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 PURPOSE OF REPORT

The purpose of this report is to provide the legislature with background information on realistic and practical policy options to stem rising and unstable premiums rates for medical malpractice insurance in Maine. The report will focus primarily on tort and insurance solutions, with a lesser emphasis on the use of increased Medicaid rate schedules for certain services and medical license reforms.

1.2 SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

2 MEDICAL MALPRACTICE INSURANCE PROBLEM IN MAINE

In this section we will describe with available information the malpractice insurance problem and its relationship to the price of liability premiums, suits and settlements brought in Maine during the last 4 years. We will also describe the current information and methods used in setting premium rates.

3 ACCESS TO CARE PROBLEM THAT RESULTS

In this section we will describe with available data the relationship between the price of insurance, volume of services and the costs of being involved in a suit. The purpose of this section is to describe how the price of insurance affects availability of care.

4 TORT REFORMS

4.1 REFORMS THAT WORK

In this section we will systematically review the malpractice tort reforms passed by states in the past 10 years and evidence of their effect on insurance premium rates and access to care. We will rely on secondary information from recent initiatives in other states. (Unpublished information is now available from the first round of effectiveness studies funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation.) We will use primary information available on the effect of Maine's tort reforms passed in 1986. .

4.2 CONSTITUTIONALITY IN MAINE

This section will give a brief overview of the constitutional obstacles that the most effective tort reforms from section 4.1 would face in Maine.

5 INSURANCE

5.1 RATE SETTING PRACTICES/METHODS

In this section we describe the current approach and methods of rate setting in Maine and evaluate the effect of alternatives on reducing/stabilizing premiums charged to Maine physicians for medical malpractice coverage. For this evaluation we will collect information on the claims exposure from malpractice incidents in Maine by class of coverage, paid losses and expenses by classes from these claims, the amount paid by insurance companies for re-insurance and the amount collected from premiums charged to Maine physicians. In this evaluation we will present policy options available to the state to reduce/stabilize the premium rates and the expected effects on the price of insurance from these reforms.

5.2 STATE ROLE IN RATE SETTING

This section will outline the expected legal effects of the insurance policy options evaluated above based on the experience from other states and the legal environment in Maine.

6 MEDICAL SERVICES REFORMS

6.1 MEDICAID FEES

This section will discuss the effects of changes in Medicaid fees on malpractice liability premium prices and availability of services to Medicaid patients. We will also discuss policy changes in the Medicaid system that have been used as physician incentives to provide care to Medicaid patients.

6.2 PREVENTIVE MEASURES

This section will present legislative options for reducing the number of malpractice incidents and claims occurring in the state and the effects of these on reducing liability insurance premiums. Included in these options are changes to medical license laws to give physicians sufficient tools to reprimand or remove the license of providers at high risk for malpractice incidents (One study in Penna found that less than 20% of the physicians were responsible for 80% of the claims.) and actions which focus on institutional providers to reduce malpractice incidents and claims in these settings.
