were appointed a committee to wait upon the Governor and inform him that a quorum of the members of the House of Representatives-elect had assembled in the Representatives' Hall and request his attend-

tives' Hall and request his attendance to administer to them the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties.

Mr. Pike subsequently reported that the committee had discharged the duty assigned it, and the Governor was pleased to say that he would forthwith attend upon the Representatives-elect for the purpose of administering to them the oaths required by the Constitution.

Thereupon, His Excellency, Governor John H. Reed, attended by his Council, entered the Hall where he assumed the Chair, amid the applause of the House, the members-elect rising.

GOVERNOR REED: Mr. Clerk and Members of this 100th Maine Legislature in the House of Representatives, it is indeed a very happy privilege for me to perform one of my first functions in connection with this 100th Legislature, and that is to administer the oath of office to the Representatives-elect of this Legislature.

First, on behalf of Mrs. Reed and myself, may I wish you a most successful and enjoyable legislative session. I am sure that we are all aware that there is a great deal of important business, state business, to attend to, and I know that to that end for a successful session you will devote a great many

hours and a great deal of effort to successfully bring to a close a very fine session of this Legislature.

Of course we do have another side of the Legislature, as those of you who have served before know, and that is the splendid opportunity to develop many fine friendships, people, your colleagues here in the House and in the Senate, and the individuals you will meet in connection with your duties and responsibilities here in this 100th Legislature. And surely as I recall my experiences in past legislatures, this is one of the finest memories that Mrs. Reed and I have, this opportunity to make so many fine friends; so I commend to you this fine opportunity to meet and to know as many new people as you possibly can.

I want to say that Mrs. Reed and I will be more than happy to see you on any occasion during this session at the Blaine House or at any of the functions that we will be attending together, and I want to wish you a great deal of success in the pursuit of your duties here.

And now inasmuch as I will have an opportunity to have your attention for a considerable period tomorrow, I will limit my remarks today and proceed to administer the oath of office to these members.

The Governor then administered to the members-elect and they subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to discharge their official duties.

The Governor and his suite then retired amid the applause of the House, the members rising.

At this time, a message was received from the Senate borne by Senator Edgar that the Senate had been duly organized by the election of Honorable Earle Hillman as President, Chester T. Winslow as Secretary, and Waldo Clark as Assistant Secretary, and that the Senate was ready to transact such business as might come before it.

And thereupon Honorable Vinal G. Good was declared duly elected as Speaker of the House of the One-Hundredth Legislature.

Speaker Good was then escorted to the rostrum by the gentleman from Madison, Mr. Fogg, where he assumed the Chair amid the applause of the House, the members rising.

Mr. FOGG: Mr. Speaker, I consider it not only a privilege but an honor to conduct Representative Good to the rostrum where he will be the Speaker for this session. I am sure that he will fulfill his duties with efficiency, wisdom and fairness toward all, and as the spokesman for the Democratic Party, I want to express the feeling that I shall do everything I can to speed up this session to a successful conclusion.

The SPEAKER: Thank you, Mr. Fogg.

Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: It is a privilege and a great pleasure after approximately eighteen months to again address you with that salutation "ladies and gentlemen of the House." On this occasion I do it as your Speaker from the rostrum. It seems a very short time since the 99th Legislature was in session and I occupied seat numbered 97. During these eighteen months which have intervened, I have had you constantly on my mind. I have deepened my friendships with the old members of the House and created more friendships among the new members. Each of you therefore can understand to some degree, although not as fully as I, the emotional impact in having you — my fellow legislators — elect me as your Speaker for this the 100th Legislature. For this I will always be eternally grateful.

I know the membership of this House quite well. The quality is high, the ability is great. In the weeks ahead each of you will have an opportunity to assert yourself. Leadership in the beginning must of necessity come from the returning members. However, I like to think that after the first week there is no such thing as a new member.

The success of this legislature will depend upon how much time each of us is willing to devote to legislative research outside of and in addition to the regular legislative session. Genius is defined as one-tenth inspiration and ninetenths perspiration.

The legislature of the State of Maine enjoys a national reputation of the very highest order for its high standards of decorum and procedure. Because it is my responsibility and because I believe this House should be shown every possible deference and respect, I shall insist on dignified observance of the rules of parliamentary procedure and the rules of the House. I hope this House will retain the good of the past and have the courage and daring to be receptive to new ideas. Along this line I would like to quote from a prayer offered in this House by Horace Colpitts of Augusta on the 3rd day of the 99th Legislature, and I quote in part:

"I pray for humility that we may be receptive to truths we do not yet know, and I pray for insight that we may see the right, and for courage that we may do the right that we may see."

And in closing, ladies and gentlemen of the House, my heartfelt thanks to you all. (Applause)

The SPEAKER: The Chair would like to point out at this time that we have not as yet adopted the House Rules which we will do before the morning is over with. Now under the House Rules, Rule 25 prohibits smoking in the House. If you are smoking at this time, you are not in violation because we have not adopted any rules as yet; so you can't be in violation of something that does not exist. You use your own judgment as to whether you are going to smoke while we are proceeding. However, I think that shortly after the rules

are adopted someone will make the motion that Rule 25 be suspended, and then you will be at liberty to smoke legally.

ORDERED, that the Clerk of the House be directed to invite the Clergymen of Augusta, Hallowell and Gardiner to officiate as Chaplains of the House during the present session.

On motion of Mr. Whitman of

Woodstock, it was ORDERED, that the rules of the House of Representatives of the Ninety-ninth Legislature be adopted for the government of this House,

On motion of Mr. Baxter of Pittsfield, by unanimous consent, the order of business as provided by the rules just adopted was dispensed with for the remainder of today and the House proceeded under orders of the day and the introductions and consideration of orders and consideration of papers from the Senate was in order during the remainder of today's session.

On motion of the gentlewoman from Falmouth, Mrs. Smith, House Rule 25 was suspended for the remainder of today's session in order to permit smoking.

On motion of Mrs. Kilroy of Portland. it was

ORDERED, that two Clerk-Stenographers be employed to provide stenographic and clerical assistance to the Members of the House. Such Clerk-Stenographers to be selected, one by the Majority Leader, and one by the Minority Leader.

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDER-ED, that the Clerk of the House include in his payroll of House Officers, the Clerk-Stenographers so employed, at a salary approved by a special committee consisting of the House members of the Joint Standing Committee on State Government.

Tabled And Assigned

Mr. Haughn of Bridgton presented the following Order and moved its passage: (H. P. 81)

ORDERED, the Senate concurring, that the first paragraph of Joint Rule 19B be amended to read as follows:

"During any regular session all requests for bills for private or special legislation and all resolves, shall be submitted to the Director of Legislative Research not later than I P.M. of the third Friday of January and such measures, in complete final form, shall be introduced in the appropriate house not later than 1 P.M. of the second Tuesday following; requests for all other legislation shall be submitted to the Director of Legislative Research not later than 1 P.M of the last Friday of January and such measures, in complete final form, shall be introduced in the appropriate house not later than 1 P.M. of the second Tuesday following."

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Bridgton, Mr. Haughn.

Mr. HAUGHN: Mr. Speaker, as you know we have set up - there was set up in the last session a committee to expedite the legislative procedure for this session. This is one of the items that was considered and brought about whereby the cloture date was set up, but in setting that date we did not establish time to allow the Legislative Research office to complete and draft these bills. As it now stands, we have to meet a cloture date and have the bills out on the same date. Therefore it is necessary for an extension of time to allow the drafting of bills not changing the present cloture date.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Pittsfield, Mr. Baxter.

Mr. BAXTER: In order to allow the members to study this rule change to a greater degree, I would like to move at this time that this be tabled and specially assigned for Wednesday next.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Pittsfield. Mr. Baxter, has moved that this order be tabled and assigned for one week from today. Is this the pleasure of the House?

The motion prevailed.

A message was received from the Senate, borne by Secretary Winslow, proposing a session of the two branches of the Legislature to be held at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon for the purpose of electing a Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Attorney General, and seven Executive Councilors.

Thereupon, the House voted to concur in the proposal for a Joint Convention and the Clerk was instructed to convey the message to the Senate.

Subsequently the Clerk reported that he had discharged the duty assigned him.

Tabled and Assigned

Mr. Jalbert of Lewiston presented the following Order and moved its passage:

ORDERED, that the House Rules be amended by the addition thereto of No. 35A to read as follows: "No bill shall be subject to amendment or debate until after it has been given its third reading or a resolve until after it has been read a second time."

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDER-ED, that House Rule 36 be amended by adding thereto the following sentence: "Amendments may be filed with the Clerk of the House for reproduction at any time after a bill or resolve is reported out of committee."

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lewiston, Mr. Jalbert.

Mr. JALBERT: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: The previous order and this one and subsequent orders stem out of this book that you received concerning a report on Interim Joint Committee on Legislative Procedure. I am fully aware of the fact that these resolves and this whole report will be studied, I understand, the early part of next week by both parties. I would like to ask the members who do not have who are not going home, to procure for themselves one of these. They are available in the library; call on Miss Edith Hary. I would like to also have the members while they are reading the report to prepare questions, to feel free to ask them and also to bear in mind that as the Speaker stated to the Press so aptly last night, this Committee was not looking for speed but efficiency, a little step-up also in the program. There is no intention at all in the report to hamper any legislator, any committee chairman or otherwise, or to take duties away from anyone, merely a point that was brought out at the last session that this Committee finally has brought about that we were somewhere along the line not cutting the corners that we could. I now move that this order be tabled until next Wednesday and be specially assigned.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Lewiston, Mr. Jalbert, has moved that this order be tabled and specially assigned for a week from today. Is this the pleasure of the House?

The motion prevailed.

Tabled and Assigned

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lewiston, Mr. Jalbert.

Mr. JALBERT: Mr. Speaker, before I make my motion, I would like the membership to understand that I am speaking on a non-partisan basis. I happen to be the only member present in the House now who served on this Committee. I now move this order lie on the table and be specially assigned for next Wednesday.

Thereupon, the Order was tabled and specially assigned for Wednesday next pending passage.

Thereupon, on motion of Mr. Kennedy of Milbridge, House A m e n dment "A" was adopted and Senate Paper 49 as amended by House Amendment "A" was passed in nonconcurrence and sent up for concurrence.
