The Communications were received and ordered placed on file.

For the purpose of ascertaining the presence of a quorum, a certified roll of the Representatives-elect was called by the Clerk of the One Hundred and First Legislature.

The elected membership of the House being 151, 151 memberselect having answered to their names, a quorum was found to be present.

On motion of Mr. Binnette of Old Town,

Messrs. BINNETTE of Old Town ROY of Winslow

Mrs. CARSWELL of Portland Messrs. CARROLL of Limerick KENNEDY of Milbridge BERRY of Cape Elizabeth RACKLIFF of Easton

were appointed a committee to wait upon the Governor and inform him that a quorum of the members of the House of Representativeselect had assembled in the Representatives' Hall and request his attendance to administer to them the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties.

Mr. Binnette subsequently reported that the committee had discharged the duty assigned it, and the Governor was pleased to say that he would forthwith attend upon the Representativeselect for the purpose of administering to them the oaths required by the Constitution.

Thereupon His Excellency, Governor John H. Reed, attended by his Council, came in and administered to the members-elect and they subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to discharge their official duties.

GOVERNOR REED: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: I would like to officially and percongratulate sonally each and every one of you upon the important responsibility that you have just taken upon yourselves, and I know that I am joined by the Members of my Executive Council, and indeed all of the people of the great State of Maine, when I say that I wish for you a very successful, enjoyable and profitable session of this 102nd Maine Legislature.

My remarks this morning are going to be rather brief, because tomorrow I have the distinct pleasure of speaking to you at length at the Joint Convention, at which time I will outline my plans and ideas for your consideration at this particular session.

I am sure that all of you are cognizant of the fact that you are here of course, primarily and basically, to discharge your responsibilities and commitments to the constituents and those voters who have displayed their confi-dence in your abilities. But I would also, of course, remind you as those of us who have served in other Legislatures, that there is indeed another side of legislative service, and this is the rare opportunity to develop friendships and to enjoy the social aspect of a legislative session. And in this context, I would like to verbally add to the formal invitation that you have received, the cordial in-vitation from Mrs. Reed and myself, to join us this afternoon at the Blaine House for the additional opportunity to become acquainted with your Governor, the Fam-

ily, and of course with each other. We feel that this indeed will be a fine session and I can think of no better way than to become acquainted on a social basis at the outset.

As I mentioned, of course, I have had the rare honor of being in one of the chairs that you people occupy today, and out of personal interest, I checked the advance list and I find that in the ten years that has transpired since I was a Member of the 97th Legislature, that there are but ten remaining in the one hundred and fifty-one members of this body. Now I am sure that this proves that everything is subject to change, even personnel, in state government. (Applause)

But I am also reminded, and I am sure you are too, that in life, changes come and changes go, government moves on, and it certainly behooves each and every one of us to discharge our responsibility to the best of our ability while we can, so that when the session is completed, we will have the satisfaction of knowing that we have done our level best for those who displayed their confidence in us, and also had an opportunity to vastly enrich our personal experience.

And so in conclusion, I am delighted and honored to be here to administer your official oath of office, and finally, to extend an invitation to all of you at any time, whether it be on official business or for a personal call, to drop by the Executive Office, and any assistance that my staff or I can render to you, we stand ready to cooperate in any possible way. Thank you, and good luck.

Speaker Childs was then escorted to the rostrum by the gentleman from Milbridge, Mr. Kennedy, where he assumed the Chair amid the applause of the House, the members rising.

Mr. KENNEDY: Mr. Speaker, my warmest congratulations to you, sir, on having been elected to this high and distinguished office. If I were to have an admonition, it would be but one, and that is that as you wield the gavel of authority you use it not arbitrarily but prudently, and if occasion should arise, and I assure you that it will, that you use it firmly, in order that good order shall prevail over this body.

To you, sir, I offer the sincere congratulations of the loyal minority, and assure you that we will offer you every courtesy and consideration that your position deserves, and my personal warm congratulations. (Applause)

SPEAKER CHILDS: The Honorable David Kennedy, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House:

On this morning of January 6, 1965, I appear before this body most humble, and deeply appreciative of the honor you have bestowed upon me.

This is the first time in over fifty years that the party of my choice has been the majority party in the Legislature. I look on this state of affairs not merely as a victory for the Democratic Party, but as a challenge to both parties. There lies before the 102nd Legislature an opportunity which few legislatures have had to such degree. And that opportunity is to resolve the numerous problems which are facing the State of Maine in these rapidly moving times.

It is incumbent on all of us to keep in mind that our first obligation is to the people of this state. There will be areas of disagreement among us, to be sure, but we must strive to limit these areas to choices of the best methods of solving the problems of the state. Although we may differ in our conceptions of the best answers, we have a basic duty to pursue policies that will mean progress for Maine.

The late John Fitzgerald Kennedy once said, "My experience in government is that when things are non-controversial, beautifully co-ordinated and all the rest, it must be that there is not much going on."

The road that lies ahead will be difficult enough without allowing partisan politics to cause us to stumble on our way. The needs of education, governmental reforms, and health and welfare are extremely pressing, and we will need the best that is in all of us to find intelligent ways of taking care of these needs.

Let us be guided by the standard John Winthrop set before his shipmates 334 years ago as they faced the task of building a new government.

"We must always consider," he said, "that we shall be as a city upon a hill — the eyes of all people are truly upon us."

Today, the eyes of all people in Maine are truly upon us — and our state government must be as a city upon a hill — constructed and inhabited by men and women aware of their grave trust and great responsibilities.

I close my remarks by pledging to you that I shall endeavor to do my very best as your presiding officer, and I request the best from you. (Applause)

At this time, a message was received from the Senate borne by Senator Harding of Aroostook that the Senate had been duly organized by the election of Honorable Carleton Day Reed as President, Edwin H. Pert as Secretary, and Waldo H. Clark as Assistant Secretary, and that the Senate was ready to transact such business as might come before it.

Thereupon, the Chairman of the Committee cast one ballot for Honorable Jerome G. Plante as Clerk of the House and that gentleman was declared duly elected as Clerk of the House of the One Hundred and Second Legislature. (Applause)

The SPEAKER: The Chair will request the Sergeant-at-Arms to escort the gentleman from Old Orchard Beach, Mr. Plante, to the Governor for the purpose of being sworn in.

Subsequently, Mr. Plante, Clerk, having taken and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties, appeared and entered upon the discharge of his official duties.

Mr. Bragdon of Perham presented the following Order and moved its passage: WHEREAS, the responsibilities of the Honorable Harvey R. Pease, of Wiscasset, as Clerk of this House have ceased; and

WHEREAS, through his many years of service, he has faithfully discharged the gravest responsibilities resting upon him in this capacity; and

WHEREAS, his native reverence for the parliamentary way has inculcated the many successive members of this House with an inspiring insight into the venerable character and functions of the legislative process; and

WHEREAS, the weight of his years of devoted service has attached a cherished sentiment to his judgment and feelings in the deliberations and proceedings over which he has so long presided; now, therefore, be it

ORDERED, that as typifying the dignity and spirit which characterizes the best in government by constitutional democracy, that the fullest measure of respect be paid to the Honorable Harvey R. Pease, without whose unparalleled service, the sessions of this body from 1933 to 1964 could not have attained the full standard of excellence seldom achieved in the legislative history of this or a n y other state; and be it further

ORDERED, as a signal mark of its affection, that an attested copy of this order signed by the Speaker be immediately transmitted by the Clerk of the House to the Honorable Harvey R. Pease, with the warmest wishes for his every further success.

The Order received passage.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cape Elizabeth, Mr. Berry.

Elizabeth, Mr. Berry. Mr. BERRY: Mr. Speaker and Members of the 102nd Legislature: I believe that little can be added today to what has been said in the past about Harvey Pease and his Clerkship of the House of Representatives. Certainly we shall hear more in the future.

I believe those of us who have served under Harvey, would say that his prime consideration, his guiding motive, was the orderly conduct of the business of the House of Representatives. Certainly he leaves behind him a monument of which he may be very proud.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lewiston, Mr. Jalbert.

Mr. JALBERT: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: I question if anyone could be as eloquent in any way as the words of the Order indicates and the remarks of my good friend from Cape Elizabeth, Mr. Berry.

However, I am one of those who has served with Harvey since 1945, and I assure every one of you here that I learned a great deal from him. As a matter of fact. seven times I was actually Harvey's counterpart or Harvey Pease. when we we had our Mock Sessions. I got to a point where I could do a pretty good job; I also got to a point where I knew not only some of the rules of the House, but I got to know some of Harvey's rules, and believe me, he can write 'em. What I want to say before he takes his leave. I am going to make very certain that I get myself either the original or a set of Harvey's rules.

Seriously, I have had many friendly tussles with Harvey over the years, and every time I came out I got spanked, but I Ι never won a decision; I learned great deal, and we always а wound up the very firmest and closest of friends. because а friendship was strong enough to withold many, many real solid, sound friendly discussions. So with all the sincerity at my command, and I know that all the Members here join me, I am certainly very happy for my young friend from Old Orchard, Jerome Plante, but certainly I have a little sorrow in my heart. Harvey, God speed. (Applause)

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Houlton, Mr. Berman.

Mr. BERMAN: Mr. Speaker, Members of the House: Harvey R. Pease has been our most excellent friend for many years, and we shall all miss him.

At this point, the Honorable Harvey R. Pease received a prolonged standing ovation. Mr. HARVEY R. PEASE: Whether you know it or not, the Speaker has just granted me unanimous consent to address the House. (laughter) Once in a while in the past thirty or forty years something went on that I didn't know about. I hardly expected anything to go on this morning, but apparently it did.

My old friends here realize that I don't apologize very often. If my actions seem precipitate this morning, it was due to perhaps an inexcusable misunderstanding of what was going on, and the lack of knowledge. Now you are not being charged as a jury, and ladies and gentlemen, you may be seated.

Let me wish you all luck, and you are going to need it. I have had a wonderful time, a wonderful lifetime, and I wish you luck in the next — what's it going to be, four and one-half months do I hear? I hope so. Goodbye.

(Prolonged applause, the audience rising, as the Honorable Harvey R. Pease was escorted from the Hall of the House of Representatives by Representative Kennedy of Milbridge)

On motion of the gentlewoman from Portland, Mrs. Kilroy, House Rule 25 was suspended for the remainder of today's session in order to permit smoking.

A message was received from the Senate, borne by Secretary Pert, proposing a session of the two branches of the Legislature to be held in the Hall of the House at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon for the purpose of electing a Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Attorney General, State Auditor, Commissioner of Agriculture, and seven Executive Councilors.

On motion of Mr. Levesque of Madawaska, it was

ORDERED, that the members of the House proceed with selection of seats; that a choice of seats be granted to Floor Leaders and Assistant Floor Leaders of the majority and minority parties; that the usual monitors' seats be reserved for the monitors appointed by the Speaker; that reelected members be granted the seats occupied by them at the last session, or their choice of seats; that the lady members be given a choice of their seats; that those members who have physical defects other than impaired hearing be given a choice of seats, and that the remaining seats be drawn by the members.

Thereupon, the members of the House proceeded to draw their seats.

The SPEAKER: The Chair at this time would like to remind the members that they should turn their blue cards into the Sergeantat-Arms and they will be given a key to a locker. If anybody so desires to change their seat, they must do this by twelve o'clock tomorrow noon and there must be a mutual agreement between you and some other member for the purpose of changing your seats. Come twelve o'clock noon tomorrow, this will be a matter of record and it will be most difficult for anybody to change their seat at that time.

Thereupon, on motion of Mr. Levesque of Madawaska,

Recessed until one-thirty o'clock in the afternoon.

The House was called to order by the Speaker.

ORDÉRED, that the Legislative Finance Officer be authorized and directed to provide the forms necessary for such purpose and provide suitable space in his office for the filing and safekeeping of all such expense accounts and other papers and records pertaining thereto (S P. 10)

Came from the Senate read and passed.

In the House, the Order was read and, on motion of Mr. Levesque of Madawaska, was tabled pending passage in concurrence and later today assigned.

At this point, the Senate entered the Hall of the House, and a Joint Convention was formed.

Which report was accepted and Kenneth M. Curtis, having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared elected Secretary of State for the political years 1965 and 1966.

The Senator from Hancock, Senator Brown, moved that by unanimous consent of this Convention the nominees for the remaining State offices to be named by this Convention be placed before the Convention by the Chairman, and that the respective contests be resolved by the same vote division as recorded in the prior division.

There being objection to the motion,

The Chair thereupon placed before the Convention the names of the nominees for State Treasurer, with the resultant vote:

The Chair declared the Honorable Maynard Dolloff elected Commissioner of Agriculture.

On motion of Mr. Kennedy of Milbridge, by unanimous consent, the nominees for election as Executive Councilors with the resultant votes: Honorables Denis Blais. Richard Broderick, Nathan Cohen. William Jabine, Robert Milliken, Pelletier, Lorenzo and Carl Cianchette received 112 votes, and the Honorables John Baxter, Guy F. Buckley, Ida M. Harrington, Lester Hobbs, Edward Kobs, Robert E. Moore, and Donald Small received 71 votes, were concurrently elected as by the vote for the Secretary of State.

The Chair declared the Honorables Denis Blais, Richard Broderick, Nathan Cohen, William Jabine, Robert Milliken, Lorenzo Pelletier, and Carl Cianchette the duly elected Executive Councilors for the political years 1965 and 1966.

On motion of Senator Norris of Oxford, it was

ORDERED, that the Secretary be directed to notify the Honorable Kenneth M. Curtis of his election as Secretary of State; Honorable Eben L. Elwell of his election as State Treasurer; Honorable Richard J. Dubord of his election as Attorney General; Honorable Armand Sansoucy of his election as State Auditor; Honorable Maynard Dolloff of his election as Commissioner of Agriculture, and the Honorables Denis Blais, Richard Broderick, Nathan Cohen, William Jabine, Robert Milliken, Lorenzo Pelletier, and Carl Cianchette, of their elections as Executive Councilors for the political years of 1965 and 1966.

Subsequently, the Secretary reported that he had notified the officers as directed.

On motion of Senator Harding of Aroostook, it was

ORDERED, that a message be sent to the Governor informing him of the election of the Honorable Kenneth M. Curtis as Secretary of State; Honorable Eben L. Elwell as State Treasurer; Honorable Richard J. Dubord as Attorney General; Honorable Armand Sansoucy as State Auditor; Honorable Maynard Dolloff as Commissioner of Agriculture, and the Honorables Denis Blais, Richard Broderick, Nathan Cohen, William Jabine, Robert Milliken, Lorenzo Pelletier, and Carl Cianchette, as Executive Councilors for the political years 1965 and 1966.

The Chairman appointed Senator Harding of Aroostook to convey the message.

Subsequently, that Senator reported that he had delivered the message with which he was charged.

The purpose for which the Joint Convention was formed having been accomplished, the Chairman declared the same dissolved.

The Senate then retired to its Chamber amid the applause of the House, the members rising.
