SENATE

Thursday, January 2, 1969

Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Rev. David W. Smith of Brewer.

Reading of the Journal of yesterday.

On motion by Mr. Hoffses of Knox,

ORDERED, the House concurring, that when the House and Senate adjourn, they adjourn to Tuesday, January 7, at 10 o'clock. (S. P. 10)

Which was Read and Passed and, under suspension of the rules, sent forthwith to the House for concurrence.

House Papers
Joint Order

ORDERED, the Senate concurring, that the Speaker of the House be authorized, at his discretion, to permit radio or sound television film or live television, or any two or three of these communication media, in the hall of the House of Representatives while the House is in session, or during joint conventions of the Legislature. (H. P. 25)

Comes from the House Read and Passed.

Which was Read and Passed in concurrence.

Bills and Resolves today received from the House requiring reference to committees were acted upon in concurrence.

ORDERS

On motion by Mr. Logan of York,

ORDERED, that the Secretary of the Senate be authorized to invite the clergymen of Augusta, Hallowell and Gardiner to officiate as Chaplains of the Senate, or to invite clergymen from other areas of the State as requested by any member of the Senate, and be it further

ORDERED, that all clergymen acting as chaplains of the Senate shall receive \$5 for each officiation with mileage at the rate of 8 cents per mile, and not less than

a minimum of \$1, for travel to and from his place of abode; the same to be approved by the Secretary of the Senate.

Which was Read and Passed.

On motion by Mr. Gordon of Cumberland,

ORDERED, that the Secretary of the Senate be directed to secure uniforms for the subordinate officers of the Senate.

Which was Read and Passed.

On motion by Mr. Mills of Franklin,

ORDERED, that the Secretary of the Senate prepare and have printed one hundred fifty diagrams of the Senate Chamber for the use of the Senate.

Which was Read and Passed.

On motion by Mr. Kellam of Cumberland,

ORDERED, that the official Reporter of the Senate be authorized to procure the services of an assistant reporter and typist during the present session.

Which was Read and Passed.

On motion by Mr. Cianchette of Somerset,

ORDERED, that the Secretary of the Senate purchase such stationary, office supplies and equipment as may be needed to carry on the business of the Senate.

Which was Read and Passed.

On motion by Mr. Wyman of Washington,

ORDERED, that subordinate officers of the Senate be appointed as follows: by the President, a Secretary to the President; by the Secretary, a Secretary to the Secretary, a Secretary to the Assistant Secretary, an Index Secretary, a Recording Secretary, and two Senate stenographers, one of whom will operate the Public Address System.

Which was Read and Passed.

JOINT ORDERS

On motion by Mr. Tanous of Penobscot,

ORDERED, the House concurring, that three hundred twenty-five (325) copies of the Legislative Record for the session of 1969 be

printed and bound, one copy for each of the members of the Senate, House of Representatives, the Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House, and the remainder to be deposited in the State Library for exchange and library use; and be it further

ORDERED, that suitable index be prepared for such Legislative Record, under the direction of the Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House. (S. P. 11)

Which was Read and Passed and, under suspension of the rules, sent down forthwith for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Anderson of Hancock,

ORDERED, the House concurring, that all printing and binding authorized by the Legislature shall be under the direction of the Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House. (S. P. 12)

Which was Read and Passed.

Sent down forthwith for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Moore of Cumberland,

ORDERED, the House concurring, that the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House jointly prepare the Senate and House Register, and that 10,000 copies be printed for the use of the Legislature. (S. P. 13)

Which was Read and Passed.

Sent down forthwith for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Martin of Piscataquis,

ORDERED, the House concurring that any Town or City Clerk or Board of County Commissioners may upon written request to the Document Clerk receive without charge, copies of all printed bills, so that there may be available to the public during the legislative session a complete and convenient file of all printed bills. (S.P. 14)

Which was Read and Passed.

Sent down forthwith for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Berry of Cumberland,

ORDERED, the House concurring, that the Legislative Finance

Officer be authorized and directed to prepare weekly, from expense accounts to be submitted to him by the members of the Senate and House, expense rosters showing the entitlement of each member for meals allowance and lodging reimbursement and to obtain approval thereof by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House respectively, and deliver the same to the State Controller for processing and payment, in the manner and form recommended by the Joint Interim Committee of the 101st Legislature created to study and report on a method of implementing the administration of the provision of law relating to the mileage and expenses for members of the Legislature; and be it further

ORDERED, that the Legislative Finance Officer be authorized and directed to provide the forms necessary for such purpose and provide suitable space in his office for the filing and safekeeping of all such expense accounts and other papers and records pertaining thereto. (S.P. 15)

Which was Read and Passed.

Sent down forthwith for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Boisvert of Androscoggin,

ORDERED, the House concurring, that there be paid to the members of the Senate and House as advances on account of compensation established by statute, the amount of two hundred dollars (\$200) fortnightly, according to lists certified to the State Controller by the Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House, respectively and that the final payrolls bear the approval of the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs. (S.P. 16)

Which was Read and Passed.

Sent down forthwith for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Minkowsky of Androscoggin,

ORDERED, the House concurring, that there be paid to the officers of the Senate and House of Representatives as advance on account of compensation, amounts

included in fortnightly lists, certified to the State Controller by the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House, respectively, and that the final payrolls of such officers at the end of the session bear the approval of the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs. (S.P. 17)

Which was Read and Passed.

Sent down forthwith for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Barnes of Aroostook,

ORDERED, the House concurring, the payroll of the officers of the House and Senate of the One Hundred and Third and the One Hundred and Fourth Legislatures who participated in the organization of the One Hundred and Fourth Legislature be paid when approved by the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House respectively. (S. P. 18)

Which was Read and Passed.

Sent down forthwith for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Katz of Kennebec,

ORDERED, that a message be sent to the House of Representatives proposing a Convention of both branches of the Legislature to

be held forthwith in the Hall of the House for the purpose of administering to the Honorables: Charles Trumbull, L. Robert Porteous, Jr., Edmund Darey, Kenneth Robinson, Richard Willey, Walter Cameron and Sam A. R. Albair the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties as Executive Councilors.

Which was Read and Passed.

The Secretary delivered the message and subsequently reported that he had performed the duty assigned to him.

A message was received from the House, through Rep. Richardson of Harrison, concurring in the proposed Convention for the purpose of administering the oaths to the Executive Councilors.

The Senate retired to the Hall of the House of Representatives where a Joint Convention was formed.

IN SENATE

Called to order by the President. The Adjournment Order having been received from the House, on motion by Mr. Hoffses of Knox, adjourned until Tuesday, January 7, at ten o'clock.
