The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot Senator Sewall

Mr. SEWALL of Penobscot: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: I think I would be extremely remiss if, as Chairman of the Appropriations Committee, I did not acknowledge the very gracious remarks of my good friend from Cumberland, Senator Berry, yesterday, and also single out two other good friends, Senator Duquette and Senator Dunn, who have worked diligently since January 2nd on this difficult budget document. Without their extremely competent guidance and counsel we never would have been able to arrive at the results which we did.

I thought it would be in order if I explained very briefly to the Senate possibly the procedures that were used in cutting the Part I Budget. There was no magic involved. We commenced the winter by visiting all twenty - six institutions here in the State of Maine, from South Windham to Fort Kent, in order to better acquaint us with the problems that we are facing at these establishments.

We also have been working on a five - day week. We have been coming in at noon on Mondays and leaving at noon on Fridays and, again, there is no magic involved here; it is a matter of doing the work and very carefully going over

the items in the budget.

The four and a half million dollar recommended cut is based to a fairly large degree on a two and a half per cent cut in many of the "All other" requests. This was not done on an across - the - board basis. Each and every department was analyzed and those that we felt could operate with a modest cut were given the cut. On the other hand, some of the smaller ones and some of the ones we felt were extremely essential, we did leave their "All other" moneys intact.

We did eliminate many unfilled positions in Personnel Services. There were something on the order of thirty of these that were cut out of the budget. These, in other words, were positions that had been authorized over the previous years and for one rea-

son or another were not filled. We also eliminated approximately eight positions that are presently filled, but in programs that we felt were not worthy of continuing.

We have recommended the elimination of two institutions: one, the Bath Children's Home and, the other, the Sanatorium in Fairfield. These call for a phase - out. We are not going to turn people out in the cold on two weeks' notice. Both of these institutions we have recommended be shut in accordance with departmental recommendations.

I think this about covers the major points that we have recommended in the Part I Budget, and I hope that you will go along with our recommendations. Thank you.

Mr. MILLS of Franklin: Mr. President, on Item 8-2, An Act Relating to the Preparation of Voting Lists, (S. P. 205) (L. D. 614), instead of just making a simple motion to table for the time-being, I would like to explain what is bothering me and then perhaps

it will be tabled until we can get it cleared up. I thought it might bother some other Senators too, and I would like to mention it.

This voting list business is a very definite concern to all of the municipalities today and also to the jury commissioners, who have to get these voting lists from all the towns and plantations throughout the State in order to make up their jury lists. There is quite a controversy going on between the jury commissioners and the municipalities. The jury commissioners feel that the entire voting lists should come up to them with full and complete addresses, and where they only need a few names from each one of these municipalities it would seem that they ought to be perhaps satisfied with the smaller number of addresses.

Now, this bill is going to be a considerable burden on municipalities. Probably in the cities where full-time registrars, thev have and they are functioning all the time in this area, they can prepare these addresses quite easily. But our voting lists would be multiplied in length a great deal if after every name the full address appeared, and also it would be a great boon, of course, to people who like to use them for mailings lists, and perhaps a great advantage - perhaps it is something that ought to be done. But I think I would like to have a little more explanation before we finally pass this Act as to what its import is going to be and, of course, there may be some amendments that I am not aware of, so I would like to have it held up temporarily, if we could.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Hancock, Senator Anderson.

Mr. BERRY of Cumberland: Mr. President, this act provides for the establishment in the State Police Department of a laboratory to assist the State Police Department in the analysis of evidence required in the prosecution of cases. I discussed this matter with the Senator from Washington, Senator Wyman, and he advised me that the negative action of his committee was predicated on the lack of funds available for the bill, which is in the vicinity of \$40,000. He indicated to me, and I am sure he would correct me if I am wrong, that this was the objection and the only objection against the bill on the part of the committee.

I think the legislation is meritorious. This is really a tool which the State Police should have. At the present time their laboratory work is done by the Department of Health and Welfare. There is increasing need, in today's administration of justice in the courts for prompt crime facilities, to have them available and to receive prompt action from them.

I think such a bill should be kept alive, and that if at the end of the session there is a smaller amount of money available for the purpose of the bill, then the decision should be made. Accordingly, Mr. President, I would move at this time that the bill be substituted for the report.
