SENATE

Monday, January 19, 1970 Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Rev. Lawrence E. Merckens of Hallowell.

Reading of the Journal of yesterday.

Joint Order

On motion by Mr. Katz of Kennebec,

ORDERED, the House concurring, that the Joint Standing Committee on Education report out to the Senate a Bill validating proceedings authorizing the issuance of bonds and notes for School Administrative District No. 70.

Which was Read.

(S. P. 629)

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Katz.

Mr. KATZ of Kennebec: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: On Saturday I learned that we have a school administrative district which has proper authorization from this legislature to begin construction. The voting of one of the towns was held improperly and bond counsel has placed the entire project under a cloud. This is an emergency, and I would ask indulgence of the Senate in passing this order.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Sagadahoc, Senator Reed.

Mr. REED of Sagadahoc: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: I don't know quite what to say, other than I might ask for a division because I did say that I frowned upon introducing bills through the way of an order. Maybe I will be the only one who votes this way, but I will ask for a division on the order.

The PRESIDENT: Is the Senate ready for the question?

The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Katz.

Mr. KATZ of Kennebec: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: In the hope of attacking the principle with the practicality of the matter, SAD 70, so I am told, is about as poor a district as there is in the State. These poor people

have been wrestling with the question of what to do about their children for a long time. In the regular session we finally, after an awful lot of soul searching, came up with this solution. I am sure that, as has been expressed to me by the people in this area, that they are at their wits' end now that they zigged instead of zagged in the very, very technical procedures to satisfy bond council. If this plea for understanding can reach your ears, I would be appreciative if this order could be passed, if not for the sake of the legislature, for the sake of the people up in SAD 70.

The PRESIDENT: Is the Senate ready for the question? The pending question before the Senate is the passage of Joint Order 629. A division has been requested. As many Senators as are in favor of passage of this order will rise and remain standing until counted. Those opposed?

A division was had. Fourteen Senators having voted in the affirmative and twelve Senators having voted in the negative, the Joint Order received Passage.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Katz.

Mr. KATZ of Kennebec: Mr. President, I hope that every member of the Senate took the opportunity to read the report of the Law Court which appeared in the House Advance Journal on Friday. It was very, very interesting reading, and it showed up the tremendous complications of the implications of the bill within the framework of our Maine Constitution.

It is very obvious that the bill, according to the Court, does have very serious constitutional implications, and it is very obvious that we are not going to further consider the bill this session. But I just wanted at this time to call the attention of the Senate to the fact that that problem which brought this bill out facing us, the problem still exists. In the City of Augusta, for example, at St. Mary's School we have presently something over 400 students St. enrolled. and Mary's, as recently as last year, told us that they would like to close. If you have been reading the K.J. there just is absolutely no place physically to put these students, and St. Mary's has agreed to continue operating. But even though the issue is not in front of us, the problem still is, and I hope that we arrive at some reasonable solution

Under the circumstances, Mr. President, I move that this paper be placed in the legislative files.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator Beliveau.

Mr. BELIVEAU of Oxford: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: My interest in this document, and also 1645, a companion document which would provide for additional appropriation of an \$13,000 for the Research Committee, is prompted by suggestions and comments that I have heard about the activities and reports of the Research Committee, and I would like to pose a few questions to some member of the Committee to see whether or not we can get some answers.

First of all. as I understand it, under 1644 whatever monies are appropriated from year to year, or from biennium to biennium, I guess, at the present time, if the money is not expended or used for the purposes outlined in the various orders, then the money lapses back into the general fund, or is it the legislative fund? I really don't know. So, my question is: Why is there a need for this legislation? Do they anticipate having a surplus available which they would want to use next year or the following year? Secondly, why is there a additional for an need appropriation of \$13,000? Thirdly, what is the amount of money that has been appropriated for this use of the biennium for the Research Committee? Hopefully, I can get responsive answers to those questions.

The PRESIDENT: The Senator from Oxford, Senator Beliveau, has posed some questions through the Chair to any Senator who may answer if he desires.

The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Duquette.

Mr. DUQUETTE of York: Mr. President, L.D. 1644 carries no appropriation. It just carries the unexpended balance from the first year to the second year.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator Beliveau.

Mr. BELIVEAU of Oxford: Mr. President, this bill doesn't say that. I am wondering, if that is the intention of the document. then possibly we ought to clarify the It would be language. m y interpretation, and it is guite clear - it says "Shall not lapse, but shall be carried forward and expended for the purpose for which the appropriation or allocation was made." That could go on ad infinitim, I suppose. Some of the projects that they are working on now, I would assume, will continue for a year or two, if not more. But, secondly, I would like an answer to my question as to why they need an additional \$13.000. although that bill is on the Appropriations Table.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Sewall.

Mr. SEWALL of Penobscot: Mr President, I think in five minutes time with Senator Beliveau it would be very easy to explain these questions to him. Rather than take the time of the Senate, I would hope that somebody might table this until tomorrow, and between now and tomorrow I would be glad to sit down with Senator Beliveau.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Knox, Senator Hoffses.

Thereupon, on motion by Mr. Hoffses of Knox, retabled and tomorrow assigned, pending Enactment.

The President laid before the Senate the fourth tabled and specially assigned matter:

On motion by Mr. Duquette of York, the Ought to Pass Report of the Committee was Accepted and the Bill Read Once. Under suspension of the rules, the Bill was then given its Second Reading.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Logan.

Mr. LOGAN of York: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: I think we can probably dispose of this business of ceilings on bonds very quickly. We all know that there are four bills, as I understand it, having to do with ceilings on bonded indebtedness. There is this one, there is an education act, one on municipal bonds in committee, and there is one on the Housing Authority coming along somewhere. The question is do we want to put a ceiling on our bond interest or don't we, and it is a judgment question. My feelings in the matter are that you can do a bad job, make a bad deal under a ceiling, just as well with a ceiling as you can without.

What it all boils down to is the competence of the people that are hired to do the work. I have no letting qualms about the Treasurer's Office use its procedures and its judgment in this matter, since they do use bond counsel and it is largely competitive. Furthermore, I can't see the Legislature chasing the bond market up and down every year. Consequently, I present Senate Amendment "A" to this document, which removes the statutory ceiling on interest. Thank you, Mr. President.

The PRESIDENT: The Senator from York, Senator Logan, offers Senate Amendment "A" and moves its adoption. The Secretary will read the amendment.

Senate Amendment "A", Filing No. S-375, was Read and Adopted and the Bill, as Amended, Passed to be Engrossed.
