I am simply trying to speak for the little fellow that can't afford to get out only during one of the three days, one of the three Saturdays, and this would give him three days over the Thanksgiving holiday to go hunting.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cape Elizabeth, Mr. Hewes.

Mr. HEWES: Mr. Speaker, I move that we accept the Minority "Ought not to pass" Report.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Cape Elizabeth, Mr. Hewes, moves that the House accept the Minority "Ought not to pass" Report.

Mr. LUND: Mr. Speaker: I arise to oppose the pending motion to

accept the Minority "Ought not to pass" Report and would speak very briefly.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman may proceed.

Mr. LUND: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: L. D. 743 would expand the participation of the State of Maine under the Interstate Corrections Compact. We presently participate in an Interstate Corrections Compact with the New England states.

The way this works is that if we have in Maine a person from New Hampshire or Connecticut who is serving time in the Maine State Prison, and it appears to be a more logical thing to have him stay during his sentence in prison in an institution in his own state. a boarding arrangement is worked out so that he can complete the remainder of his term in the state from which he came. This has several advantages including which his family can visit him and he can be more likely, I think, to get a job closer to where he came from

This bill would expand this beyond the New England states, so that this arrangement could be expanded to include other states other than just the New England states. And if the House votes against the pending motion to accept the "Ought not to pass" Report we would then move that the "Ought to pass" Report be accepted.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cape Elizabeth, Mr. Hewes.

Mr. HEWES: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: I submit that there is no need for this legislation. This deals with prisoners who have been sentenced to jail either in Maine or in other states. Presently of course if a prisoner is sentenced to, say, to Thomaston State Prison he will serve out his term there. But we do have a compact, that is an agreement with other New England states which will permit a prisoner, if he is in fear of his life or health say at Thomaston or if he is threatening others in Thomaston, they could

be transferred to any of the other New England states.

So we presently do have a method of having prisoners that are in trouble here in the Maine prison being transferred to other states, and conversely — this is a reciprocal compact by which out-of-state prisoners could be transferred into Maine prisons. So we presently do have this system as applies to the other New England states, our six New England states.

This L. D. 744 would enlarge that to include all fifty states, the other forty-four states. So that if a person is sentenced to jail in Maine here, he might be transferred we will say down south, or conversely someone down south, a prisoner down there would be transferred up here.

Now at the hearing the Warden of the Maine State Prison was present and indicated only one prisoner is presently in New Hampshire out of Maine, only one prisoner is out of Maine under the present New England Compact. So I submit there is no need for this nation-wide interstate compact and I hope that you will vote in favor of the pending motion, which is "Ought not to pass".

The SPEAKER: The Chair will order a vote. All in favor of the motion of the gentleman from Cape Elizabeth, Mr. Hewes, to accept the Minority "Ought not to pass" Report will vote yes; those opposed will vote no.

A vote of the House was taken. 74 having voted in the affirmative and 43 having voted in the negative, the motion did prevail. Sent up for concurrence.

Mr. FINEMORE: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: On this map they placed on our desks today I find that there is one section that is left out of the open season where there are more moose dying, I believe than anywhere else in the State, and I think the game wardens will all report the same, in my opinion.

Mr. McNALLY: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: I move we reconsider our action of yesterday whereby we adopted Senate Amendment "A", filing number S-87.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman Ellsworth, Mr. McNally moves that the House reconsider its action of yesterday whereby we adopted Senate Amendment "A" to Bill "An Act relating to Fees for Inspection of Motor Vehicles." Is this the pleasure of the House?

(Cries of "No")

The SPEAKER: The Chair will order a vote. All in favor of reconsideration will vote yes; those opposed will vote no.

A vote of the House was taken. 61 having voted in the affirmative and 58 having voted in the negative, the motion to reconsider did prevail.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Ellsworth, Mr. McNally.

Mr. McNALLY: Mr. Speaker, I now move that this amendment be indefinitely postponed.

The SPEAKER: The pending question would be adoption. We have reconsidered whereby it was

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Berwick, Mr. Stillings.

Mr. STILLINGS: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: This piece of legislation has been debated three times before on the floor of this House, and I very reluctantly argue again today.

The bill as it is amended, it seems to me, is the only appropriate way for this piece of legislation to come out of this body. If we are seriously interested in highway safety, if we are seriously concerned with beefing up, with improving our inspection programs here in the state, then we must leave the amendment on the bill as it stands.

This amendment provides funds to put some teeth into the program, to eliminate the so-called sticker lickers from the program.

At the same time, it allows the station owner, the inspection station mechanic to realize a gross return of \$1.70 per inspection rather than the ninety cents that he realizes now.

I would just like to point out again, the bill does produce \$400,000 in new revenue to the state. There has been no increase in the inspection fee to the station owner for twenty years, since 1951 when it was raised from fifty cents to one dollar. And I certainly would hope that you would vote against the motion to indefinitely postpone the amendment.

The SPEAKER: The Chair will explain the parliamentary question of the Senate Amendment "A". We reconsidered whereby we adopted it. So now the pending question is, shall we adopt Senate Amendment "A". If you vote yes you will be adopting it; if you vote no you will not be adopting it.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Enfield, Mr. Dudley.

Mr. DUDLEY: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: I am sorry to have to converse on this same issue again today. However, yesterday I tried to explain the issue, and I wasn't feeling very good, and I voted accidentally for the motion. And then my colleagues thought they were doing me a favor, they voted with me.

favor, they voted with me.

So today I am going to try to vote to indefinitely postpone Senate Amendment "A". Now this wasn't — when we started inspecting automobiles, this measure wasn't intended for a tax measure. It was an identification that you had had your car inspected, and the mechanic was supposed to do the work before he put the sticker on.

Now ironically, it seems to me, to increase this 100% at a day when we have such things—we commonly hear inflation and taxes; people are very jittery about taxes. This from a dollar to two dollars is a 100% increase, and it seems absurd to me.

Now while I am on my feet this was a unanimous committee report without this amendment to leave it at a dollar, and this House, on at least two other occasions has very definitely voted to leave

this fee one dollar. And I hope they will this afternoon.

I hope that we won't be led around by another branch of government with their amendments. I am sorry that I made a mistake yesterday, and I will assure you I will vote right today.

And one other thing. This does not produce \$400,000; I don't know where he got this figure, maybe out of the sky. But they sell of these stickers, about 500,000 a year. That is for both inspections, twice a year. And they now get ten cents for them, and this new bill proposes an extra twenty cents. And there will be some additional revenue from the school bus stickers. And let me say this, that it is hard to get a unanimous committee report out of your committee, and it is also hard out of our committee. And this was a unanimous committee report, and I do hope you will support it and indefinitely postpone the Senate amendment.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Ber-

wick, Mr. Stillings.

Mr. STILLINGS: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: Apparently I need to defend my mathematics. If we inspect one million vehicles twice each year, and the difference in the cost of the sticker is twenty cents, the sticker would be sold twice each year. It seems to me that this would come out to \$400,000 in the biennium.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Ellsworth, Mr. McNally.

McNALLY: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: wasn't going to say anything along this; in fact I hesitated about asking for reconsidering. Then I got to reading the paper today. And up in Washington they are thinking of freezing all wages and prices; very seriously thinking of it. And right now you have a third reader on a moose bill for no other purpose in the world except to raise money. That is all it is for. There is nobody that cares for the moose; it is just to raise money for the Fish and Game Department.

Now here you are going to work and passing something if you leave this amendment on that will give no better inspection, and it will cost the people, which after all it is the people-it is not the people that run the garages—it will cost the people that have their cars inspected the money to pay for it. And if money is as tight as it is from what it says in the newspapers and from what the Fish and Game Department claim, why they even told me this fall that they didn't have money enough to make game law books enough so that the people that sold guns and ammunition and didn't sell any licenses, out-ofstate licenses, they couldn't have three or four law books in whenever an out-of-state hunter wanted one. And that has always upset me to think that they were so poor.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Brewer, Mr. Norris.

Mr. NORRIS: Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I am a little confused. I don't know what the Fish and Game Department has to do with this bill. But apparently they have something according to Mr. McNally.

I would submit that at least 80% of the garages in the State of Maine can't drive a car through the door for two dollars and cover that portion of the overhead. I think it is an idiotic argument we are having here this morning, and I would hope that everyone would vote for the adoption of Senate Amendment "A".

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Enfield, Mr. Dudley.

Mr. DUDLEY: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: As I understand it from the State Police, we inspect less than 250,000 cars, and twice a year would be some 500,000 cars. And so this is where the figure from the sky was wrong. And there are very few cars that get in and out of a garage for two dollars. They hardly open the door and shut it down for two dollars. And if any of you have been in there you must know that.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Bangor, Mr. Kelleher.

Mr. KELLEHER: Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I get up to support Mr. McNally's motion this afternoon. We are inspecting these cars twice a year. I don't agree that we are going to improve the inspection any by increasing the fee.

I know on both sides of the

I know on both sides of the question, whether you are in favor or against the motion, we are for safety. And I can't see for the life of me if we increase the fee to two dollars that we are going to help the safety measure out any more than it is right now.

The only thing that bothers me is, we are still picking the same little fellow's pocket. We are not going to reduce the gas tax by any means, or anything else. And as far as I am concerned I am satisfied with just what the price is right now.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Oakland, Mr. Brawn.

Mr. BRAWN: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: When the vote is taken I hope it is taken by the yeas and nays, because I don't want the people in my district that I represent to think I have doubled up the price on them.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Norway, Mr. Henley.

Mr. HENLEY: Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I am not going to take much time, but I want you to know that I know something of what I have talked. For twenty years I was an auto mechanic, so I know something about the things involved. For fifteen years I partially ran the service department and parts department for a dealership, so I know something of the value of having that sign station." "examination I know. and Mr. Dudley has said before, that it is certainly of value to have that sign there to get the business

I know a good many times the owner of the garage has stated that it would be worth it if they did it for nothing, because you must understand and you must realize that if they get your car

in there and they replace a light bulb, they can charge for labor in addition to their dollar.

Now I had my car inspected recently, and as far as someone driving it in, I drove it in, and I hardly had time to get my money out to pay for it when I backed it out again. There happened to be nothing particularly wrong with it. And a car — you see them on the road today, nine out of ten of them are late models and it doesn't take over five or ten minutes and they still can inspect the car and do it safely. It is the old heaps that cause the problem, and those are causing a problem no matter whether you pay two dollars or ten dollars. So I feel that a few of the garages that are hollering for more money, they want to get on the gravy train.

But who are we helping, the few people in the garages or the hundreds of thousands of people who have to have a car? We are digging into their pockets for everything. I understand there are more bills to dig into their pockets on increasing license fees and so forth, So I hope you will not go along with the adoption of this amendment.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lewiston. Mr. Call.

Mr. CALL: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: This inspection business has gone too far. I will admit there is something personal involved. But if I had to pay well over a hundred dollars the last time I had my car inspected, others must have had the same miserable experience.

Two mechanics literally had a picnic finding things allegedly wrong, and I know there weren't that many irregularities. People who know me know that I am very careful with my car and with everything else that I own as far as that goes. My car is no junk heap.

I beg this House to stop this amendment. We have gone too far now.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Van Buren, Mr. Lebel.

Mr LEBEL: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I see this bill here is going to have a revenue of \$600,000 a year. You just look at the bill on page nine, item number seven. In this bill we are going to lose \$115,000. I wonder if Mr. Stillings wanted to raise that money to pay for what we are going to lose on the other bill, when we lose this \$115,000. And I can tell Mr. Stillings that we cannot transfer the money to the other department.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Enfield, Mr. Dudley.

Mr. DUDLEY: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: Since I am in this business and I don't want to come down here to feather my own nest, I want my people to know how I voted. I would like a roll call, please.

The SPEAKER: The pending question is on the adoption of Senate Amendment "A". A roll call has been requested. For the Chair to order a roll call it must have the expressed desire of one fifth of the members present and voting. All members desiring a roll call vote will vote yes; those opposed will vote no.

A vote of the House was taken, and more than one fifth of the members present having expressed a desire for a roll call, a roll call was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The pending question is on the adoption of Senate Amendment "A" to Bill "An Act relating to Fees for Inspection of Motor Vehicles," House Paper 1256, L. D. 1576. All in favor of the adoption of Senate Amendment "A" will vote yes; if you are opposed you will vote no.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Ellsworth, Mr. McNally.

Mr. McNALLY: Mr. Speaker, I now move this bill be engrossed.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Berwick, Mr. Stillings.

Mr. STILLINGS: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: Since this bill in its present form no longer carries any of the original intent of the bill as it was proposed; it does nothing except exempt some special interest groups from having their equipment inspected, I now move that this bill and all its accompanying papers be indefinitely postponed.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Berwick, Mr. Stillings, now

moves that item 16, L. D. 1576, be indefinitely postponed.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Enfield, Mr. Dudley.

Mr. DUDLEY: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: Where I come from they call this type of thing sort of a sorehead when you do a sort of a trick like this.

But actually, let me tell you, the rest of this bill had a unanimous committee report and it does do a lot of things. First of all, it corrected some things that the State Police wanted done. Namely, they have to send men around and license these stations every year, and it ties up a lot of their police force going around and licensing these stations. Now the part of the bill that they wanted, they want to license these stations for every three years at the same amount of money — a dollar a year for three years rather than go around every year and relicense them. That is in there.

They were the ones who came to the committee and said there was no need to license these big bulldozers off the road because they had no way to enforce it and no place to put the sticker and it was almost impossible to inspect them, and they don't ride them on the highway anyhow. So again we went along with the Maine State Police, thinking they knew probably what they were talking about. They have been enforcing this for some time.

There were other inspection stations, and the biggest gripe the honest inspection station had was trying to earn an honest living and do a good inspection was this that when he takes school buses into his building it occupies the whole building where normally he could be working on four or five cars. With a school bus in there it occupies his whole shop. He has to fill out three or four forms one for the superintendent of schools and one for the school bus and one for the State Police and one for himself, and this is very time consuming, and the piece of paper he has to fill out has some 20- odd questions, as I remember it, on it. And for this reason the committee went along

extended school bus inspections from two dollars to five dollars. And all of these recommendations were the unanimous recommendation of the Transportation Committee.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Brew-

er, Mr. Norris.

Mr. NORRIS: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: Apparently the daisy wilts when it gets in the sun. I go along with Mr. Stillings with his indefinite postponement.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Kennebunk, Mr. Crosby.

CROSBY: Mr. Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House: A very short comment. We have accomplished something. We have saved these inspection stations one dollar so that now those who operate an inspection station can get a three year license for five dollars, as before they had to pay six dollars. I think they have accomplished something.

The SPEAKER: The pending question is on the motion of the gentleman from Berwick, Mr. Stillings, that this Bill "An Act relating to Fees for Inspection of Motor Vehicles," House Paper 1256, L. D. 1576, be indefinitely postponed. If you are in favor of indefinite postponement of this bill you will vote yes; if you are opposed you will vote no.

Mr. DONAGHY: Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: The hour is late. My speech such as it is, will be very short. I think this is nothing but a so-called HEP Commission report. We have already been through it. I don't think we need another one, remember what happened over a year and a half ago.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Eagle Lake, Mr. Martin.

Mr. MARTIN: Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: Let me try to explain the reasons why I asked for a roll call. I personally don't know that much about it, and I understand it came out of the Committee on Education, and they can defend the bill.

But there were four votes shy of being 101 for final enactment, and I would hope that if the members of the Education Committee can defend the bill that we ought to pass it; if they can't, then we ought to kill it.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Dix-

mont, Mr. Millett.

Mr. MILLETT: Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I don't want to appear to be defending the bill, but I would like to explain what it does, and I think there is significant merit to the bill.

There is a recommendation of the Maine Education Council that the whole university system ought to be studied primarily with respect to the fees that it is charging in the form of tuition. It is the feeling of many that the university system actually is subsidizing, or being subsidized, by the legislature and therefore the state, for middle and higher income people in the form of the relatively low tuition which we are charging.

We also have a bill before this Legislature which is a bill sponsored by Representative Haskell that would actually allow for the private sector of colleges to take a little bit of the brunt of the burden of places, student places off

the university system.

Now it is the feeling of many that the whole tuition structure needs to be studied not with respect to where we are building colleges. I want to assure the gentleman from Lubec, Mr. Donaghy, that this is not the intent, and therefore I think the parallel with the HEP Commission is in no way valid.

Our concern here is primarily to study the fee structure in terms of the tuition system that presently exists, what we might do to better provide for opportunities for low and middle income students to attend a private or public college within their means.

I would also call your attention to the fact that this bill carries no price tag. The intent is that if it is enacted here today, a request has already been made through the Higher Education Facilities Act Commission, which is a federally funded department within the Department of Education, and funds have been requested to further this study. So we are not actually representing an investment of state funds at all.

I think the intent of the study is very good, and I believe the bill deserves your support.

The SPEAKER: The pending question is enactment. This is an emrgency measure and a roll call has been ordered. If you are in favor of enactment you will vote yes; if you are opposed you will vote no.

I think it was argued well then that we don't want to indemnify employees who might tend to be less careful if they knew that their employer, the municipality or the state was going to pay any damages resulting thereby, and I hope that you will oppose the motion to reconsider.

Mr. EMERY: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: I had a conversation last night with the gentleman from Cape Elizabeth.
