SENATE

Tuesday, February 2, 1971 Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Rev. Fr. Renald

C. Hallie of Bangor.

Reading of the Journal of yester-day.

Papers from the House Non-concurrent Matter

Bill, "An Act Relating to Political Advertisements on State Property." (H. P. 18) (L. D. 27)

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Hichens.

Mr. HICHENS of York: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: We have heard a lot of reports about roofs collapsing under the heavy snows this year, but last Thursday afternoon a roof collapsed where there wasn't any snow whatsoever. That happened to be the Legislative Document which I sponsored and which has been sent back to us in nonconcurrence.

I was a little disturbed, not over the action of the other body, but because of the procedures by which this bill came out "Ought to Pass." With no reflection whatsoever on the Chairman of the Committee, they were told, and we read in the newspapers, that the gentleman claimed he was not approached, and the report came out unanimously "Ought to

Pass." There were also two other bills which he used as an excuse for the reasoning of the Committee in passing this bill, and as I talked to the gentleman today he claims he was not present at the time that came out "Ought Not to Pass."

And with the new rule that we have set up this year, it poses a very serious problem to me, because on this one we can act with an "Ought Not to Pass" resolution, and no action can be taken whatsoever without the unanimous consent of the bodies. I feel that prevent such things from happening in the future that the committee chairmen should made aware of this fact, and it should be a completely unanimous "Ought Not "Ought to Pass" or to Pass" report under the conditions which are warranted.

I therefore move that we recede

and concur with the House.

The PRESIDENT: The Senator from York, Senator Hichens, now moves that the Senate recede and concur with the House. Is this the pleasure of the Senate?

The motion prevailed.
